As a group, the 2020 Year 12 they have shown real leadership across our school, being tremendous role models to the whole school in behaviour, manners and work ethic. Throughout their senior years this group has shown a real tenacity for hard work, often involved in before school tutoring, holiday workshops and on-line learning seminars. #### Subject Selections 2019

Subject selection for years 9, 10 and 11 (2021) is now completed and the list of electives on offer is finalised. Some students who did not get their preferred electives will be asked to choose new ones. Any student who has not yet done the subject selection, especially if they have enrolled recently, must see Ms Ram to choose their electives. Accelerated Music and Accelerated Maths are among the electives for the Gifted and Talented students who will do their HSC in these subjects when they are in year 11.

#### **Minimum HSC Standards**

Year 11 students who did not meet the minimum HSC standard in year 10 in 2019, attempted a Readiness Test this term. Year 10 students will have their turn next term to sit for their Minimum Standards test. Due to COVID-19, students will be allowed four attempts this year as compared to the two attempts in the previous years to demonstrate competency in reading, writing and numeracy. Students can do the Practice Readiness Test before attempting the actual test. Thanks to the hard work of the Ms Love, many more students at the school have now achieved the minimum HSC standard.

#### **Enrichment Testing**

This year invitations were sent out to the feeder Primary school students to participate in an Enrichment test. The test itself was on the 14<sup>th</sup> September, and ensures placement in the Year 7 Enrichment class in 2021 for all students who met the selection criteria. A similar Enrichment test for the Year 8 and 9 Enrichment classes of 2021 was on the 23<sup>rd</sup> September. These tests will prevail in the future and be a requisite for entry into the enrichment classes. It will also be available to new enrolments into Granville Boys High school.

#### Examinations

Year 11 students have just completed their Yearly exams. Next term, they will embark on the HSC course in their respective subjects. The year 10s will have their Yearly examinations in weeks 3 and 4 of term 4. Year 10s will complete LLN Robots test to develop their literacy and numeracy skills following the Yearly exams and then sit for their HSC Minimum Standards test. They will also complete their mandatory "All My Own Work" to qualify for enrolment into year 11. After this, students will do a 2-week work experience (Weeks 8 and 9). This year, we will not run 'Taster Lessons' for year 10s in term 4.

#### **Review of Student Performance**

This year, Mr El-Homsi and I have worked relentlessly with students and their families supporting the students achieve the learning outcomes they are capable of. This has required a huge investment of time supporting them to overcome any adversities to achieving their potential, providing extra support to meet their wellbeing and learning needs. Tuesday tutorials and external tutors have been made available to ensure that those students who qualify to transition to year 12 are capable of working independently and maintaining good standard of work.

#### Year 12 Graduation

Amid the uncertainty imposed by COVID-19, Year 12 Graduation will not have the usual Granville Boys style celebration. However, as a school, we will recognise the contributions of the young men in year 12 through a low-key celebration. Unfortunately, parents will not be allowed on school grounds, but they can join us via live streaming. I would like to wish our graduating year 12 students all the best in their HSC and life beyond school. A well-deserved holiday to all students.

# DEPUTY PRINCIPAL'S REPORT Mr Thomas

As Term 3 draws to its conclusion, I reflect on the many wonderful things that have taken place at Granville Boys High School over the last term. The SRC has once again been a productive and proactive force in the school. Under the expert guidance of Mrs Kiran, they held a highly successful fundraiser for Lebanon in the wake of the devastating explosion in August, designed new articles of uniform, made various other proposals to improve the school facilities come to fruition and they have continued to represent the student body with excellence and pride. They are now in the process of planning their Term 4 fundraising activity which will support the underprivileged of the local area at Christmas time.

Year 12 have now completed their final term of school and earlier this term acquitted themselves well during their trial examination period. Liaising has begun with our feeder primary schools to begin the process of orientation for our incoming Year 7 of 2021. Next year, we are excited to welcome record numbers of Selective and Enrichment students to the school. Our school continues to grow and change, as you will see in 2021 and beyond.

On an administrative and planning note, this term the executive and senior executive staff have been writing a school Situational Analysis in preparation for the formulation of our new four year Strategic Improvement Plan (SIP) which will drive our vision of school improvement for Granville Boys High School from 2021-2024. # WELFARE REPORT Mr Pakkiam

Student Welfare is the concern of every staff member of staff at Granville Boys High School. In its widest context it covers the safety of all students in our care, their emotional, social and intellectual wellbeing as well as their conduct and behaviour. Although, in term 3 many of the welfare pograms were put on hold due to the pandemic, the students have been participating in many in school activities and programs to enhance their learning and their wellbeing.

One of the main focus of the welfare team has been student attendance. This includes monitoring whole day attendance, partial attendance and lateness to school. We will continue to work with parents/caregivers, students and the wider school community to improve our attendance. Below is the department of education's policy on school attendance,

**Compulsory schooling and attendance (Department of Education, NSW)**Regular attendance at school is essential for students to achieve quality life outcomes. Schools, in partnership with parents, are responsible for promoting the regular attendance of students.

Parents or carers of children of compulsory school age are responsible for ensuring their child attends school every day. Children must commence school by age 6 and then complete year 10.

After Year 10 and until they turn 17, students must be:

• in school or registered for home schooling or

- in approved education or training (e.g. TAFE, traineeship, apprenticeship) or
- in full-time, paid employment (average 25 hours/week) or
- in a combination of work, education and/or training.

Enrolled students 17 years and over are required to attend school regularly to meet Higher School Certificate course requirements.

# Attendance and absences (Department of Education, NSW)

Parents of children from Kindergarten to Year 12 must ensure their children attend school every day. On occasion, your child may need to be absent from school. Justified reasons for student absences may include:

- being sick or having an infectious disease
- having an unavoidable medical appointment
- being required to attend a recognised religious holiday
- exceptional or urgent family circumstances e.g. attending a funeral.

Parents must provide an explanation for absences to the school within 7 days from the first day of any period of absence. Where an explanation has not been received within the 7-day timeframe, the school will record the absence as unjustified on the student's record.

#### **School Uniform**

Another focus of our school this term has been uniform. The eexpectation of our school community is that all students attending GBHS will be dressed in the school uniform. It should be the aim of every student to wear the uniform with pride and to take care of it. Added advantages are that the wearing of a uniform provides students safety when they are in public, helps students develop positive and respectful relationships and experience a sense of belonging to their school and community. The parents and community of GBHS have a firm commitment to the necessity and safety benefits of a full school uniform.

The uniform shop at school is open every Wednesdays from 8:30am to 2:00pm.

#### SRC

This semester the student representative council (SRC) and Ms. Kiran have been actively involved to provide resources to make GBHS a better place. The school now has 100 lockers which are used by the students to store their valuables and books. In term four the school will also have a brand new Gymnasium for the students in block 2. This will be run by the PDHPE department and SRC members will be rostered to support the teachers. The students also worked well together to design a new t-shirt and hat which will be available from next year.

Apart from this the SRC raised funds for much needed causes. Over \$400 was raised through mufti day for the cancer council. During the term the student representative council organised a footy jumper day to raise funds for the explosion in Beirut, Lebanon. On the same day, sausage

sizzle and kanafeh was also sold by SRC and we collected over \$2200.00 for Beirut. We would like to thank Mrs. Safa Al-Ghoul for providing the sausages and Mrs. Saadieh for preparing the delicious Kanafeh. We would also like to thank Sheik Weissam and Mr. Ahmed Dennaoui for helping with the fundraiser.

#### Vaccinations

We had a very positive response from the parents towards vaccination this year. Year 7 students were vaccinated for Human papillomavirus (HPV) and year 10 for Meningococcal diseases. Students who missed out on these vaccines should either contact their GP or the department of health(www.health.nsw.gov.au) for further information.

#### PBIS

Our Positive Behavioural Interventions and Supports (PBIS) team has been busy regenerating PBIS at GBHS. This term we have been working on revamping the merit award system and getting quotes for the new PBIS signages which are to go around the school.

The new reward system will be introduced to complement the existing system. It is called RASL (Respectful and Safe Learners). Students can earn these rewards for various positive behaviours such as being in full school uniform,

Being on time to school/class, completing classwork/homework, respectful behaviour etc. Students will be required to simply write their names on the reward cards and drop them off in the box in the front office to be in the draw to win one of the 10 prizes each week.

# ENGLISH REPORT

#### Year 7

Students in Year 7 undertook an introductory study of poetry and responded to the focus question: 'How do composers use poetry to express themselves?' The literacy focus for the term was poetic techniques and using figurative language. A range of classical international, Australian poetry and contemporary song lyrics was analysed and discussed throughout the learning unit. Students composed an anthology of different forms of poetry as part of their assessment work.

#### Year 8

Students in Year 8 undertook a film study of *The Iron Giant* and a non-fiction text study of the Cold War and space race to respond to the focus question: 'Why do we have a fear of the unknown?' The literacy focus for the term was visual literacy and techniques, including the symbolism of colour and the metalanguage of film production. Students storyboarded their own scene and analysed it as part of their assessment work.

#### Year 9

Year 9 undertook a film study of *September* and a non-fiction text study of the Aboriginal Australian experience to respond to the focus question: 'How can we all get along?' The literacy focus for the term was discursive writing and visual literacy, including the metalanguage of film production. Students composed their own feature article, which analysed the themes and techniques used in the film, as part of their assessment work.

#### Year 10

Year 10 undertook a film study of *V* for Vendetta and a nonfiction text study of what it means to be a hero or villain to respond to the focus question: 'How do we tell the difference between a hero or villain?' The literacy focus for the term was persuasive essay writing and visual literacy, including the metalanguage of film production. Students composed their own persuasive essay, which analysed the themes and techniques used in the film, as part of their assessment work.

#### Year 11 & 12

This term has been a very important one for our senior students in regards to their assessment work. Year 11 completed their Yearly Examinations, which gave them a clear idea about how to improve and develop their skills as they head towards the HSC course. Year 12 embarked on their Trial HSC examinations and finalised their assessment work. Students are now able to reflect on their results and respond to the feedback they received from their teachers as they revise for their HSC examinations. Congratulations to all the boys for their hard work and effort, especially to our first cohort of Extension English 2 students. We hope all our students succeed in the HSC and their future endeavours.

# MATHEMATICS REPORT Ms Khan

Term 3 is almost over and it has been a very busy term for both students and teachers.

Staff members who teach year 12 classes have written final reports for the year 12 students and have also been preparing students for their HSC examinations by providing revision materials and revising content in class.

Year 12 students are in their final weeks of school before HSC commences next term. They had their trial exams in weeks 3 and 4 and students are strongly advised to act on the feedback and recommendations from their teachers to improve their success in the HSC examinations. For students to do well they must embark on a study routine to improve their ability to recall and apply knowledge when needed. It is very important to revise by doing questions from past exam papers because mathematical skills can only be refined by regular practice. Maths is a "doing" subject and the more a student practices the better developed his skills and techniques become. Students need to have a thorough look at the reference sheets provided in the exam to know what information is available to them and what they need to memorise. Students can practise questions from past HSC examinations. These exams can be accessed through the link https://educationstandards.nsw.edu.au/wps/portal/nesa/11-12/resources/hsc-exam-papers.

Students are also highly recommended to read the marking guidelines provided.

During the term 3 school holidays, there will be tutorial sessions happening in school to support students in their HSC preparations. Students have been given a timetable for these sessions and they should take this opportunity to seek further help from teachers and tutors.

We wish them all the best in their HSC exams and most importantly as they move on to different phases of their lives after school.

At the beginning of this, term  $(30^{th} \text{ July}) 21$  students from years 7 to 10 sat for the Australian Mathematics Competition. This is a very competitive exam and the school takes part in this competition each year. The AMC is an engaging 30-



problem competition that demonstrates the importance and relevance of mathematics in students' everyday lives. Students from many nations participate to demonstrate their logical thinking and problem solving skills. We have received the results of this competition.

Year 7 Distinction - Nabil Uddin, Credit – Rameen Hassan, Yahya Imran, Hannan Imran and Eddie Dien, Year 8 Credit – Sadman Sami, Year 9 Credit – Anshuman Tripathi, Zaiyan Ahmed and Henry Wu.

Year 7 and year 8 students have access to Mathsonline and regular homework exercises are set for the students to complete. Students must regularly check their Mathsonline account to complete set tasks. Students also have access to the video tutorials to help them understand concepts at their own pace. The interactive questions also give students feedback on their understanding of the concepts.

At the beginning of term 3, Maths faculty took part in a project to help improve the numeracy skills of our year 7 students. Students were tested and a series of lessons were taught to students involving different strategies for learning number sense concepts.

Students were very involved and enthusiastic during these weeks and showed a vast improvement in their numeracy skills.



For students to be effective learners in school, they must bring all their equipment for their classes. They all must have **grid books** and **calculators** as well as writing equipment such as pens, pencils and rulers. Students should check their timetables before coming to school and pack all the necessary equipment for their classes. I would like parents to help organise their children for school.

Finally, congratulations to our intern Mr N Kloper from the University of Sydney for his efforts in his development as a classroom teacher and on behalf of all the MATHS staff we wish him the very best in his teaching career.

# SCIENCE REPORT

This has been a very busy term in the Science Faculty.

Our young scientists have completed many exciting experiments and investigations.

Year 7 Have learnt how to classify animals and plants and related them to their habitats. Students completed an assignment of Feral animals and the effect they have on Australia's indigenous environment.

Year 8 have learnt about rocks and minerals and completed a student research project (SRP) of their choice

**Year 9** learnt that the Earth we inhabit is a dynamic and powerful natural system where Earth movements and changes are constantly working together.

9 Science Investigation (9SI) and 10 Granville Science Investigations (10GSI) have been a great success. These Science electives are skills based following the working scientifically outcomes. Students had an amazing and exciting laboratory experiences by inferring and observing given hypothesis and then learn how and why things happen around them.

Year 10 have been learning about Genetics and Biotechnology.

Year 11 have been completing the preliminary course and from outstanding hard work comes excellent results.



Our distinguished Year 12 scientists have completed their formal subjects and have been revising for the HSC examination.

# HSIE REPORT Mr El Homsi

Once again, it has been a very busy term for the HSIE Faculty. Mr Kolar's Year 7 HSIE selective class, 7 Plato, engaged in sprint lessons this term. As a part of the school's focus on literacy and numeracy progressions, two literacy intensive sprint lessons took place, one focusing on listening and writing skills, and the other focusing on paragraph structure.



The first sprint lesson students engaged with a dictogloss, a process which sees the teacher read out a text and the students write a written summary of what they hear in their own words. In this particular instance, the text was about historical sources and contemporaneous accounts from the Viking Age, which helped students gain a more in-depth understanding of Viking daily life and settlement. It is evident that the students are highly engaged and having fun as they learn to enhance their listening skills and think about how they summarise what the teacher is reading in their own words.

The second sprint lesson saw students work on their paragraphing skills by receiving a jumbled paragraph before they were asked to piece the paragraph together in its proper sentence order. This activity tapped into the students' literacy and critical thinking skills as they attempted to bring grammatical and structural order to the jumbled paragraphs they each received. For this activity, the paragraphs were about the geography and natural features of China which helped shape ancient Chinese culture, beliefs, and civilisation. Literacy-focused sprint lessons will be continuing in Term 4 as the school maintains its literacy focus.



Ms Kiran's Year 8 HSIE class have been highly engaged in the Geography unit 'Water in the World.' Students worked in groups and conducted surveys on how to sustainably manage water. Through their investigation, students collected data and constructed bar graphs. They also wrote a report on the campaigns the government could conduct to inform people about the importance of water and how to maintain it for future generations.

The introduction of Ms Donnelly's HSIE Robotics program has worked hard over the course of this term. This new elective subject took place in the new robotics room which was fitted out with functional furniture and a storage area for our robotics equipment during the last school holidays. Granville Boys High School students have already benefited from having this great facility and program at our school and have developed their robotics skills as well as their 21st century learning skills of collaboration, critical thinking.



The Year 9 Robotics elective class worked on their robot design and programming skills as well as spending countless hours during recess, lunch and after school preparing for the First LEGO League competition, which will be held in Term 4. Each week, students participated in a 2-hour workshop with robotics tutors from Macquarie University. Atakan Ozturk, Anhinav Talasani, Nimal Sivakumar, Shaheer Rahman, Akshar Hossain, Mohammad Ibrahim, and Zack Hosari created a 45-minute live-streamed YouTube presentation for the Macquarie University FRC Workshop Series, which is viewed by robotics students and industry professionals from all over Australia as well as overseas.



On a final note, congratulations to the 18 students from Year 9 who have been selected to participate in the Fast Forward program with Western Sydney University. The program aims to increase awareness of post-school educational opportunities and promotes the benefits of lifelong learning and the career paths to which it leads. The students participated in a webinar in Week 7 and an interactive orientation program in Week 10. Students will continue this program right through to when they are in Year 12 and will work with Western Sydney University mentors over the next three years.



For our senior students, Term 3 marks a crucial point in their education with the Year 11 Yearly Exams and the HSC just around the corner. For Year 11 students, the upcoming exams mark the transition from the Preliminary Course into their final year. As proud teachers in the HSIE faculty, we want to congratulate our students for their continued application throughout the COVID period. A special congratulations to our Year 12 students, including Ms Ghosh's Legal Studies, Mr Kolar's Ancient History, Mr Mandarakas' Modern History and Mr Elhomsi's Business Studies classes who stay back regularly after school to attend extra lessons throughout the week. This year almost 40 boys will sit a HSIE exam in the HSC. We wish them all the very best

Industrial Technology Timber have just finished their final assessment task- Timber Stool Project, displaying some innovative designs and quality work displayed. Next term will see Year 11 commence the HSC part of their chosen courses. We wish them all the best.

Year 7 and 8 have enjoyed working on numerous units in Technology Mandatory this term.
