

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT Mr Dixon

For my bulletin report for term 4 I've uploaded my speech from last Wednesday's 2021 Academic Awards ceremony. It gives a good summation of the school improvements carried out in 2021.

We are a community school and we always want parents to attend these important school events. We want you to celebrate your son's achievements, but these are extraordinary times, and this has been an extraordinary year for our school. Covid has swept through this community and there has been too much suffering. This has been a tough, tough year and it makes the achievements of the award winners today, all the more remarkable.

The most disadvantaged of our students during this time were the year 12 class of 2021, It's not been easy. Apart from lockdowns and online lessons, these students had to put up with the uncertainty of HSC exams, family members with covid and an extended HSC timetable. The Year 12 teachers have done an outstanding job preparing these boys in these difficult circumstances. In my almost 30 years of teaching, this has been the most difficult time to do the HSC.

It was tough for the whole school as well. For term 3 and part of term 4, our school was in lockdown, students, teachers and families have had to readjust to again learning online, learning from home. To facilitate this, we have loaned out over 100 laptops to students, so students don't miss out.

In 2021 our teachers employed an explicit teaching model that focused on higher expectations in behaviour and work in the classroom. It's school, students understand they're here to work. In 2021 we introduced a whole school tuition program that included after school homework club and an Intensive Saturday morning tutoring program. Every Saturday morning during term time, from 8am to 11.00am over 65 students from each year group, took part in tutoring sessions in both English and Mathematics. In 2022 we will expand our tutoring system to include after school tutoring for all students, 4 afternoons a week.

Our school motto is 'Aiming for Excellence' In our school's Strategic Improvement Plan we set targets to improve areas that are important. Our school is on target to reach important milestones in HSC, attendance, Naplan and student wellbeing. In particular, our 2021 Naplan results showed a significant improvement from previous years, and we will continue to "Aim for Excellence" in all areas of our school.

In 2021 we have expanded our peer mediation program, our year 10 students, including Riad Al Dahabie and Zac Sugulle and Nasser Rifahi are our peer mediators, helping to solve many disputes between students, helping to make our school a safer place. Many of this year's HSC students have received offers University before sitting their exams. for Congratulations to Ahmed Al Farrajah, (Law and medicine) Farouk El Chami (Engineering), Zimran Anjum (Computer Science) and Masroor Montasir.(Medical Science offers from no fewer than 4 universities. Ms Bailey deserves much credit for her work with students early university offers.

During lockdown our whole school learnt to engage from a distance, we learnt how to reward students for good work. RASL's have been a big hit, with big prizes on offer. An initiative of Mr Collins, Mr Keski-nummi and the PBIS team, The RASLs reward system reengaged many of our students in their learning and continues to play an important role in recognising positive behaviour by our students.

Speaking of honours, Two of our teachers have won awards this year. Mrs Andraos received the Metropolitian South Principal's network award for Outstanding teaching and Mrs Ghosh won the Western Sydney teaching Excellence award. Mrs Ghosh will be presented with this award at school in early 2022 by Australia's Foreign Minister, Senator Marise Payne.

It's been a big year for MS Donnelly and the Robotics students. At last week's FIRST National Championships, our team of Henry Wu, Atakan Ozturk, Zayian Ahmed and Abanav Talisani, Mohamad Ibrahim, Nimal Sivakumar, Adam Ozkan & Zack Hosari won the robot design award, Ms Donnelly won coach of the year and our team came 4th overall out of 48 teams from all around Australia.

Lots of development going on at our school this year. Our new oval refurbishment will be ready to run on, play footy and soccer and tips as well play cricket in our new cricket facility. The oval will be ready to use at the start of 2022. As will the new senior outdoor study area behind block 2. We look forward to 2022.

First group of Accelerated mathematics students will sit the Higher School certificate whilst in Yr 11 we thank Ms Vinod for her work with this group. We have high expectations for these students and are confident of excellent HSC results in 2022 for our accelerated students.

For all the troubles of 2021, this is a better school than it was at the start of this year. We will continue to raise the standards in 2022.

If I have a wish for 2022 I want a more normal school year. Where our students can play sport against other schools again, have debates against other schools, go on excursions, go fishing, have assemblies, go on school camps, do all the things that make school exciting. But if Covid 19 continues to impact our lives and makes us not be able to do all these activities, the teachers, the sass staff, will go on to meet the learning needs of the students of GBHS. At Granville Boys, we will continue to aim for excellence.

DEPUTY PRINCIPAL'S REPORT Ms Ram

Good Practices to enforce in 2022

Attendance

Being on time to school and class ensures that learning opportunities are maximised. Classes start at 9 am each school day and all students are expected to be in class. This term we have rigorously implemented the school's attendance policy. Attendance monitoring will be a strong focus in 2022 as the school gears up for academic excellence. This will include sms to parents for lateness and phone calls for truancies. Persistent lateness not only impacts on students learning, it affects their overall attendance percentage, which must be above 85%, and attracts consequences for the student. Parents must write a note when their son is sick or away from school for any other reason.

Uniform:

Coming to school in school uniform gives students a sense of belonging and an identity. They are identified as proud young men of Granville Boys High school. It also creates a sense of equality among boys. Junior students (years 7 - 10) must have grey shirt, grey pants, black shoes. Senior students wear white shirt, black pants and black shoes. PE and sports uniform is green polo shirt and black shorts. All students must uphold the school image and come to school in their proper school uniform. Students are required to bring their PE uniform and change into them during Sport or PE. They are NOT to come in their PE uniform from home. School uniform will no longer be sold from school. Parents and students can buy their uniform suppliers from Oz Fashions which is open 6 days of the week.



Back to School Preparation

In preparation for the 2022 school year, students are required to have the following: Stationery:

Students must buy one writing book per subject and a few spare ones, pens, pencils, calculator etc. All books must be covered. This is just a guideline. Subjects will have their own specific requirements. Parents must take advantage of the 'Back to school' sales at the start of the school year to buy school gear. (bag, shoes, water bottles etc). GBHS has a Bring Your Own device policy. Students are required to bring their own laptops to use at school.

Opal Cards

Students must have a valid opal card to travel on the School bus 511 or 514 or any public transport (bus or train) Application for Opal cards need to completed this year for it to arrive in time for school next year. Use the link below.

In analysing our NAPLAN results for numeracy and literacy it is evident that the strategies implemented by teachers have had a positive impact.

Over the last term the Positive Behaviour Interventions and System team (PBIS) team have worked on better integrating the Award System and the House system into the school's Positive Behaviour matrix. Congratulations to Mr Collins, Mr Eidentas, Mr Kolar and our newest member Ms P Mai and Mr El Homsi for all their efforts. Teachers will first be introduced to the new procedures at our first School Development Day and to students at our first assembly.

Next year, the new house system will be trialled and events like the Deputy Principals' excursion will be tied to the system making it easier to recognise and reward those students who are consistently working to the best of their ability and behaving appropriately, this includes the wearing of school uniform and punctuality.

Teachers this term have continued with their work on differentiation and are modifying current programs and rewriting many others to include strategies that are proven to promote improved literacy and numeracy outcomes for students

Despite the learning from home period, achievement has been front and center of everything we have done this year. Congratulations to the FLL Robotics team which has gone from strength to strength over the last two years and who as a team only narrowly missed out on placing third and travelling to Russia to compete. What is significant is that they held their own against University and other adult teams as well as being the highest placed school team.

Congratulations also to Mr Koh and the students of the Chess club who also achieved high placings in the State tournament.

As Acting Deputy, it has been a huge year and I have enjoyed the learning, laughter and opportunities that have come with acting in the position of Deputy Principal at Granville Boys. <u>Welfare</u>

Through the help of the welfare team, we have established new protocols that will streamline all welfare concerns at our school. I would like to thank this opportunity to thank and wish our school counsellor Jessica Cashman all best at her newly appointment school. She has been a pivotal part of the welfare team and has served our school with passion and dedication. You will be missed Jessica! Our newly appointed Student Support Officer Wesam Charkawi has hit the ground running at Granville Boys High School with his involvement and care towards our students at Granville. Year 10 students of 2022 will be given the opportunity to take part in the 'Who am I?' program developed and run by Wesam Charkawi. The cognitive behaviour program is designed to facilitate positive change and growth in young students.

Attendance 2022

In 2022, we have initiated a new attendance improvement program at Granville Boys High School that specially targets whole day attendance, partial attendance and lateness to school. Our aim is to help students achieve a 90% attendance rate and reduce the later arrival to school. Students who achieve and maintain an attendance rate of 90% will be rewarded with a Deputy Principal reward excursion. We will continue to work with parents/caregivers, students and the wider school community to improve our attendance in 2022.

Important information about attendance:

Attendance at school is compulsory, five days a week. Apart from the legal requirements for attendance, it is important that students gain continuity in their education to move ahead as they should. It is possible that due to an unsatisfactory record of attendance, a student is not meeting course outcomes, this could affect a student's eligibility to receive their ROSA, Preliminary Certificate or Higher School Certificate. It is, therefore, important that students develop habits of good attendance right from the start. The school recognises, however, that for a variety of sound reasons such as illness, dental appointments, family emergencies etc - that students may not be able to attend school every day. In such cases, an exemption from school is granted and recorded on the rolls. A written explanation such as doctor's certificate is still required on the child's return to school. Please read the following paragraphs closely.

WHOLE DAY ABSENCES

If your child is absent due to illness or any other unforeseen reason a phone call to the school office is advisable. A note should also be produced on the first day back to school and presented to the relevant Year Advisor or the front office. If a student is away for any reason and you have not contacted the school, you will receive a phone call home from the relevant Year Advisor advising you of your child's absence. A written explanation is still required on the child's return to school. Absentee notes can be collected from the Year Advisors or me. Unexplained student absence is reported on school reports. Any extended leave of absence, including overseas travel must have prior approval from the Principal.

FRACTIONAL TRUANCY:

It is essential that students attend every class in a day. At the end of each school day Deputy Principals and myself will check the truancy register and follow up on all students who have been recognised as fractional truants. Unauthorised absence is treated as a discipline issue and will result in sanctions such as afternoon detention. Parents are informed of such breaches through phone contacts.

LATENESS TO SCHOOL:


School starts at 9:00 and students must straight away go to their period 1 classes. Students arriving late to school will miss out on the work covered during period 1. If your son is late to school, they must report to the front office and collect a late note before attending their classes. Parents will be notified of students who are regularly late to school. Students who are late 3 times or without written explanation will be placed on after school detention.

Uniform 2022

A school instils the right values, a positive attitude, and the will to achieve things in life. - Year 7 students will be offered a two-dose course of Human Papillomavirus (HPV) vaccine (6 months apart) and a single dose of Diphtheria, Tetanus and Pertussis (dTpa) vaccine.
- Year 10 students will be offered a single dose of Meningococcal ACWY vaccine Catch-up program
- Year 8 students will be provided their 2nd dose of HPV vaccine, postponed from 2021.
- Year 7 and Year 10 students who returned signed consent cards during 2020 & 2021 but missed vaccinations, will be offered these vaccines in Year's 8 & 9 and Year's 11 & 12, 2022.

MATHEMATICS REPORT Ms Khan

This term started with the school being in lockdown and remote learning continued. Teachers kept students motivated and working through out this time to help them prepare for their upcoming assessments. This term is coming to an end and the teachers in the Mathematics faculty have been busy with assessing students and writing their yearly reports. Many of the junior students have performed extremely well in their assessments. Accelerated Maths Year 10 students have started their HSC Mathematics Advanced course and have completed their first HSC assessment task with students performing at a very high level.

The year 12 students have also had their first formal HSC assessment task. For all the Mathematics courses this task was worth 25% of their assessment mark for the final HSC exams. After completing this task, students must realise that a thorough preparation for HSC tasks are required so that the results could contribute towards the quality of their grades. Therefore, students should take the opportunity during the Christmas holidays to catch up and master the content of the preliminary course and the first topics of the HSC course. The NESA website has past examination papers with the solutions and comments from the markers.

Students should read through the markers comments to see where most of the mistakes have been made by previous students. Students should also attempt the questions related to the topics they have completed to get an idea of the examination type questions and start preparing for their HSC exams.

In preparation for the beginning of next term and the new school year, students should get themselves ready to be back in school by making sure they have all the equipment they require. A 5mm A4 grid book (covered), a scientific calculator and other writing stationery will be needed for effective learning next year.



ENGLISH REPORT Ms Ghamraoui

Term 4 has been a very busy term for both students and staff in English. We welcomed all students back to faceto-face learning and are excited to be back in the classroom.

Year 7

Students in Year 7 were introduced to Shakespeare and underwent a comparative study of 'Twelfth Night' and the modern adaptation. 'She's the man'. Students examined the texts to the inquiry question, answer 'Who's using Shakespeare's ideas?' The literacy focuses during



this term were discursive writing and using sensory language in texts.

Year 8

Students in Year 8 engaged in an Urban Myths unit that explored classical myths and legends. They examined the history of myths and legends to answer the inquiry question, 'Why are we fascinated by the unreal?'. Students looked at various informative texts and explored how language is used to persuade and/or manipulate an audience.

Year 9

Year 9 students responded to the inquiry question, 'How has masculinity been portrayed in poetry over time?'. Students studied a collection of poems from around the world and composed their own texts in response to the inquiry question. The literacy focuses during this term were persuasive writing and poetic forms and features.

Year 10

Year 10 students engaged with the multimodal text 'The Boat'. Students examined how digital text types are used to communicate in today's technological age. Students examined 'The Boat' to answer the inquiry question, 'How has technology changed the way stories are told?' The literacy focus was visual literacy.



Year 11/12

Year 11 embarked on their first HSC module – 'Texts and the Human Experience'. Students across all three strands of English completed this common module, using different texts as their focus. Students in the English Advanced course completed a digital multimodal presentation for their assessment work and students in the English Standard and English Studies courses completed a persuasive text. We farewelled the 2021 Year 12 students and wish them all the best in their future endeavours.

SCIENCE REPORT Mrs Bolbol



This has been a very busy term in the Science Faculty. Our young scientists have completed been

working hard transitioning from online learning to face to face learning.

Year 7 Have learnt how about Space and Earth Year 8 have learnt about Cells and Body Systems Year 9 learnt that the Earth we inhabit is a dynamic and powerful natural system where Earth movements and changes are constantly working together.

HSIE REPORT Ms Donnelly

What a great term 4 we've had in the HSIE faculty, despite the obvious challenges and limitations resulting from covid.

This term, our focus in the HSIE faculty was on increasing the integration of technology into our HSIE lessons. Students have been enjoying engaging lesson activities using new technology applications such as Nearpod. Students have been presenting their work using software technologies such as Cospaces 3D software, Canva, Scratch and Minecraft.

Year 7 History students have really enjoyed studying Polynesian history and learning about the traditional customs and culture of our Pacific Island neighbours. The students have developed their source analysis skills and have excelled in presenting their work in interesting ways.

Year 10 history students have excelled in their understanding of the Rights and Freedoms unit of work by engaging with the play The Freedom Ride by local Sydney writers Graham Jones and Jepke Goldsmit, and understanding the struggle for rights and recognition that indigenous Australian people have faced.

Ms Stella Smit has been a fantastic new addition to our faculty this term. Her Year 11 Modern History students have been studying a unit on Power and Authority, focusing on totalitarianism and the rise of dictators. They have been provided with opportunities to develop skills explore their interest and curiosity about people and events that have had a significant impact on the modern world.

Year 8 Geography students have explored what it takes to make a place liveable and have examined the liveability of various places around the world including the suburbs where they live.

Stage 5 Geography students studied the topic Sustainable Biomes. Students have identified the physical features of biomes and investigated threats to biomes and the effect of those threats on biomes. They have also explored factors influencing and affecting farming and food production in Australia. There is no doubt it has been a significant cognitive challenge for students while learning remotely, but most students have overcome the challenges and were able to perform well in their yearly examination.

Our 10HSIE1 class also applied the finishing touches to their Parramatta Light Rail project. They used Cospaces 3D software to create a virtual reality model of the soon to be finished Parramatta Light Rail network. Their project included the students' own geographical and historical research including local indigenous history.

Our year 12 HSIE teachers Mrs Ghosh, Mrs Kiran, and Mr Mandarakas worked tirelessly to prepare their

students in Legal Studies, Retail Studies, and Modern History subjects for their HSC exams. I wish our 2021 HSC students the best as they await their results and make decisions about their futures.

The GRANBOTS, the Granville Boys robotics team, competed in the National FLL Robotics Competition this term. They finished 4th in a field of 48 teams (2nd, 3rd and 4th place were all very close in the scores). The Granbots were the only school team in the top 6 teams with at least 3 of the other teams from robotics academies. In this competition, the Granbots were awarded the Engineering Excellence Award, the Robot Design Award, and the Best Coach Award. The Granbots are already strategising for their next competition. Great work Granbots!

Year 9 and 10 elective robotics students have been busy designing, building and programming Vex robots. They have been practising on our new Vex competition field and are preparing for the competition to be held next year in term 1.

Our Year 8 selective students in the Innovative Learning class studied the space race and communicated their research using various software technologies including Cospaces and Minecraft to create 3D models, and Scratch to create interactive games about the space race.

MUSIC

The return to school in mid term 4, 2021 was a welcome relief for both staff and students after the extended, exhaustive online learning period. Year 7, 8 and 10 music students were treated to a Video Game music topic which encompassed technology to teach past and present video game music. 8 bit chiptune music is the original soundtracks to the 1980's video arcade games which people over 30 would remember. It was composed solely on the computer chip. Tetris, Space Invaders and Pacman are just a few to mention. The students created their own composition of chiptune music using the Beepbox software. A lot of fun was had listening to, performing and analysing a variety of genres within video game music. The students also learned about the role music plays in creating SFX, background music and adaptive soundtracks.

Year 12 HSC Music

Students in year 11 transitioned to year 12 in term 4 thus moving forward with their music 1 course. Having completed their Preliminary Course with some outstanding compositions from Lene Lene and Mohammed Abdul Rahman, students began their first HSC topic, an Instrument and its repertoire. Through term 4 students researched and produced a viva voce on their chosen instrument. They explored the concepts of music demonstrating their knowledge and understanding of the course outcomes. The final product was a 10min presentation with demonstrations and for their first HSC assessment task the benchmark has been set.

LOTE

In Term four Year 7 students have been studying Japanese sports and hobbies. Prior to the unforeseen circumstances of Covid, it was planned to practically incorporate several popular Japanese sports into lessons. Students researched popular sports in Japan and Australia. Students also studied a variety of Japanese creative arts and popular hobbies origami (paper folding), calligraphy, manga, and regional travel.

COMPUTERS
