In this newsletter I would like to discuss the School Certificate. The School Certificate is the official qualification that a student can obtain after completing compulsory (or mandatory) requirements secondary schooling. It is offered by the NSW Board of Studies under the NSW Education Act of 1990. The main parts of the School Certificate are the five curriculum areas that have an external exam component, English, Mathematics, Science, History & Geography, Civics and Citizenship and Computing. Additionally there are elective subjects that students undertake at school like PASS or IST, which are assessed through school-based assessments and these also appear on the actual School Certificate. Student performance is judged by rankings across the state from Band 6, the highest, to Band 1, the lowest with the majority students in NSW falling into the average ranges of Bands 3 & 4. There is no quota of the number of students in each performance band so theoretically every student could receive a Band 6 in one subject.

The School Certificate is partly used by the NSW Department of Education and Training (DET) to map the progress of each of its students. Starting with the National Assessment Program, Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 and then progressing onto the School Certificate, the NSW DET accumulates data that shows individual student achievement trends across all years of schooling. These trends can be used to predict how a student will perform in the HSC. For example if a student performs at a 'proficient' level in the NAPLAN, the prediction would be that this student will also perform well at the HSC level. There is a high degree of mathematical correlation between the overall performance trend and the HSC result.

So how well a student does in the School Certificate is one of the main indicators of how well a student will do in the HSC. These days, with most students going on to Yrs. 11 and 12, many don't see the relevance of the School Certificate to their overall study and therefore they don't try very hard because it doesn't "mean" anything to them. Students who believe this myth are doing themselves and their families a great disservice. The reality is that serious study for the School Certificate

breeds excellent study habits for the senior HSC years. If you can do it at the Year 10 level then you are well set up to repeat the result in the HSC. Students don't magically change in the two months between Year 10 and the beginning of Year 11. Secondly, if you try your best in the School Certificate then your result will give you a good indicator of how well you might do in the HSC. Therefore the School Certificate is important because it helps you know how well you are performing in comparison to the rest of the state.

The following advice is of a general nature and students and parents should check with Year Advisers or Head Teachers before committing to a particular option. Generally speaking, students who perform at levels of Bands 4-6 in most School Certificate subjects should seriously consider tertiary (university) options for their HSC. Students who perform at Bands 1-3 in most subjects should probably consider doing VET subjects for the HSC and not consider seeking an Australian Tertiary Admission Rank (ATAR). The option is to sit for a more vocationally orientated HSC. There are now two new subjects in English (English Studies) and Maths (Applied Maths) that offer more practical content that is very suitable for a non-ATAR HSC. When these subjects are combined with the VET subjects offered at Granville in 2011 such as Hospitality, Retail, Information Technology and Industrial Technology - Construction, the Non-ATAR HSC becomes an excellent vocational preparation course.

In considering the School Certificate results, the tricky one is Band 3 where a student shows some ability but needs to work very hard to perform well at the HSC level. It is considered rare for a student to rise two Band levels in any subject between the School Certificate and the HSC but it is possible and there are examples every year of students who achieve this feat. If your son performs at Band 3 level in most subjects, then much thought needs to be done in choosing the HSC subjects. Employers clearly favour young people who have an HSC qualification over a School Certificate one. So even if you have chosen a non-ATAR pattern of study, completing the HSC pathway is important for many reasons. The system is biased in favour of HSC graduates and your son will know, when the School Certificates results are known, his likely prospects in the different pathways.

Over the past several weeks I have interviewed the majority of Year 10 students in regard to their future pathway. Ms Bailey attended the interviews to ensure students made the correct decisions for the future occupation they wish to have. The process was based on the following steps:

- 1. Students stating what they wish to do.
- 2. Our evaluations of their reports for the Half Yearly and sometimes Yearly from last year.
- 3. Discussed their interests and looked at several appropriate pathways to achieve their goals.
- 4. A path is picked based on interest and prerequisite courses.
- 5. Parent and student agree and sign.

This process was lengthy to ensure students chose appropriately. Over the past 3 years since instigating the process in 2008 I have found that there is less need to change subjects in Year 11 due to the fact that students understand why they need to work hard and maintain results in a particular subject. The process also helps parents and students open a dialogue about what the student really wants to do.

As part of the School's commitment to Information & Communication Technologies for student engagement we have begun Skills workshops for teachers. This is based on our review of the past year and needs identified by staff. So far we have run the following workshops after school:



ENGLISH REPORT

How time flies when you're having fun! It's hard to believe that 10 weeks have passed since the last vacation.

We wish Year 12 the best of luck for their Higher School Certification examination and for whatever venture they choose in 2011. Their HSC results will reflect their hard work and they should continue to seek feedback from their teachers until the examination. A revision programme over the vacation will benefit all students in the examination.

Year 11 Extension, Advanced and Standard English classes are undertaking their yearly examinations. The results of which will inform what English course each student should take for Year 12.

Year 10 has completed the 'area of study' unit, *Heroes and Villains*. A group of Year 10 students will visit the cinema to watch 'Tomorrow When the War Began'. Half of year 9 has finished the *Macbeth* unit and students have been amazed to find that many of Shakespeare's ideas are still relevant today. They have translated the original language into modern colloquial language and performed parts of the play. The other half of year 9 has enjoyed a graphic novel study – *Jekyll and Hyde*.


Early Career Teachers

I have also been meeting with Ms. Watchirs-Smith in Computing and Mr. Ivandic in HSIE to provide them with the guidelines for Accreditation.



Accreditation Update

Teachers were able to share a myriad of Pedagogical and Behaviour Management strategies that they have implemented to engage students and

promote their learning. I would like to congratulate all teachers on the diversity and high quality of their presentations. They were both informative and inspirational.

Literacy Workshop

A whole day Literacy Workshop was run with the ECTs this term with Lyn Marsh the Literacy Consultant from the DET South Western Sydney Region. The day was an excellent opportunity for ECTs to be exposed to and develop a wide range of literacy strategies. The focus of the day included:

Programming and Assessment Back Mapping from Assessment Tasks

The Literacy Demands in Assessment Tasks

The explicit link between Programs and Assessment Tasks

Creative approaches to the 'Three Level Guide' to reading.

Teachers were able to make the Professional Learning relevant and applicable to their everyday teaching practice through working on an existing Program and Assessment Task from their faculty. Embedding Intellectual Quality in our lessons is always a challenging task and the day was very beneficial in that it provided teachers with a range of structures in order to do this.

Accreditation Workshops

This term I organised two full-day Accreditation Workshops in order to facilitate the Accreditation Process of New Scheme Teachers. Teachers who graduated after 2004 are required to meet Professional Teachings Standards under the NSW Teachers Institutes 7 Elements. There are 42 Professional Teaching Standards that fall under the following categories:

ELEMENT 1	TEACHERS KNOW THEIR SUBJECT CONTENT AND HOW TO TEACH THAT CONTENT TO THEIR STUDENTS.
ELEMENT 2	TEACHERS KNOW THEIR STUDENTS AND HOW THEY LEARN.
ELEMENT 3	TEACHERS PLAN, ASSESS AND REPORT FOR EFFECTIVE LEARNING.
ELEMENT 4	TEACHERS COMMUNICATE EFFECTIVELY WITH THEIR STUDENTS.
ELEMENT 5	TEACHERS CREATE AND MAINTAIN SAFE AND CHALLENGING LEARNING ENVIRONMENTS THROUGH THE USE OF CLASSROOM MANAGEMENT SKILLS.
ELEMENT 6	TEACHERS CONTINUALLY IMPROVE THEIR PROFESSIONAL KNOWLEDGE AND PRACTICE.
ELEMENT 7	TEACHERS ARE ACTIVELY ENGAGED MEMBERS OF THEIR PROFESSION AND THE WIDER COMMUNITY.

I have been working collaboratively with the ECT's this term on creating, collating and annotating appropriate evidence to demonstrate that they have implemented the standards in their everyday teaching practice. Some of the evidence has included; Unit Programs, Lesson Plans, Scope and Sequence Plans, Differentiated Learning Plans, Lesson Observations, Student Report, Student Referrals, Student Work Samples, Assessment Task Criteria Student Feedback and Professional Learning Logs. The workshops were beneficial for teachers as they were provided with support, release time and resources to complete this time consuming process.



ECTs Maintaining Accreditation

We also have a total of nine New Scheme Teachers that are maintaining their Accreditation. This means that they have achieved their Accreditation at Professional Competence and will be going for Professional Accomplishment

over the next five years. These teachers are Ms. Andraos in Science, Ms. Gandouin, Mr. Egan and Mr. Budnik in English, Mr. Rutherford in PDHPE, Mr. Odei in TAS, Ms. Bhamjee in Learning Support, Ms. Holland in Computing and Mr. Shouk in Mathematics. Part of this process is that teachers must complete 100hours of Professional Learning over 5 years from becoming accredited. 50 hours must be Institute registered learning (courses officially recognized by the NSW Teachers Institute) and 50 hours can be made up teacher identified learning (research, staff development days, conferences, workshops). The Professional Learning and Leadership Directorate of the DET has developed an online PL site specifically targeting this group of teachers called the 'Classroom Teacher Program'. There are various modules and I have set up one of the courses at GBHS called 'Policy and Application of Professional Judgment'. I am hoping to run this course with a group of New Scheme Teachers next term.

South Western Sydney Aboriginal Education Network


I attended the South Western Sydney Aboriginal Education Network last week to look at the development of 8 Epistemologies (ways of learning) developed in conjunction with Local Aboriginal Elders and Quality Teaching Practitioners from the DET. This is an innovative Pedagogical Model that has been developed for Indigenous students but can be applied to all students.

Traditional Western Pedagogies have greatly marginalised Aboriginal (and NESB) students and this model seeks to teach *through* culture rather than *about* culture. The 8 way model includes:

Story Sharing Learning maps Non Verbal

- Community Links
- Deconstructing/Reconstructing

Non Verbal - Non Linear Symbols/Images - Land Links



Many issues and strategies for teaching Aboriginal students can also be transferred to students from low socio-economic and non- English speaking backgrounds. The above model is one worth investigating as an alternative Pedagogical Model and I hope to do so with all ECT's next term.

It has been a pleasure working with a very dedicated, enthusiastic and professional group of Early Career Teachers this term and I look forward to continuing a positive working relationship with students and teachers and creating better outcomes for the whole School Community.

As you already know the year 11 and 10 boys are completing their Yearly exams. Teachers are continuing to revise coursework with their Year 12 students - so it's important that the students continue to meet with their teachers.

Year 9 Geography classes are using their laptops to complete a research task on changing Australian communities.

Year 9 History classes are creating posters on either Don Bradman, the Sydney Harbour Bridge or Phar Lap. Year 8 are learning to conduct a survey and how to collate and present the information gathered in a word processed document. Year 7 History are about to begin their assessment task which is to create a board game based on the religion of Ancient Egypt. Students will be working closely with their teachers but are strongly encouraged to also work on it at home.

The Year 9 History Elective class has finally completed their filming of Ned Kelly's last stand and are about to move onto a unit entitled Survival.

MATHEMATICS REPORT

Granville Boys High School joined schools from all around Australia in the 'Reach for the stars' activity which was part of the National Literacy and Numeracy Week. http://reachforthestars.nlnw.edu.au

The theme of the National Literacy and Numeracy Week this year was 'Learning for Living'. The collaborative initiative by the Australian Government and the school community highlights the importance of effective literacy and numeracy skills for all children and young people. The activity was developed by the Australian Association of Mathematics Teachers to encourage fitness activities within numeracy learning.

The week gave schools the opportunity to get involved in a range of activities and to recognise the achievements of students, teachers, parents and members of the community who support young people to develop stronger literacy and numeracy skills.

Schools across Australia kicked off National Literacy and Numeracy Week by undertaking a series of shuttle runs and recording the number tokens they can collect in a set amount of time. This allowed students to collect data, make predictions and compare results with other classes all over the country.

The shuttle run involved four teams of students taking turns to run 20 metres to drop a token into a container and then return to the next student so they can take their turn. All teams recorded their total by placing the collected tokens in a container and the total number of tokens the class collected in 2 minutes, 4 minutes and 6 minutes were tallied.

This was a great opportunity for the students to collect, share and investigate data. It provided students with real-life numeracy activities, cross-age interaction and quality learning through practical activities. In 2010, there were over 77 000 participants in 3567 classes and nearly a million tokens were dropped into containers.

Students were very keen to get involved and the participation rate was high. Although the activity was not conducted as a competition, the Students enthusiasm and eagerness to move as many tokens as possible

fuelled a healthy competition between Year 7 and Year 8. After completing the mandatory runs of 2 and 4 minutes, Year 8 had successfully collected more tokens, but during the longer 6 minute run, Year 7 was more successful.

Selecting two different year groups for the event worked very well and encouraged higher participation rates of students and greater engagement in the activity. Although the majority of students were fasting throughout the event, this didn't affect their motivation and added to the success of the event.

REACH FOR THE STARS ACTIVITY





As we are nearing the final weeks with Year 12, the Maths faculty has been revising previous topics and preparing for the HSC exam. The students have been reorganised according to their potential and level of achievement, so that they can complete different levels of questioning. This will hopefully assist students to improve their individual band performance. As part of the revision programme, students will be informed about useful and effective study tips for the critical six weeks before the HSC exam.

This time is a great opportunity for students to begin their revision and preparation for the 2010 HSC. Students can use these last few weeks gaining a competitive advantage over their peers by doing exercises from past HSC exams and the exam revision book, which is available at the school. All Maths teachers will be

available in the coming weeks for extra tuition and support.

The Maths teachers are presenting instruction and learning material so that students learn how to:

- Improve their ability to decipher the HSC questions so that they can identify what is required by various questions?
- Effectively answer higher order questions.
- Develop a range of strategies through available resources to improve performance for assessment tasks and exams.
- Assess their current performance and then work on the skills needed to lift their performance

Parents should encourage students to:


- Attend as many classes as possible before the 14 October start date.
- Prepare or follow a revision timetable, aimed at covering all topics in the time available.
- Review the topics and look for gaps in their knowledge and ask teachers for assistance.
- Test themselves on topic summaries using the resources from the HSC book or support material provided by their teachers.
- Understand the use and application of formulae, rules, diagrams, charts, and maps.


A reminder to Year 12 students that there are some General Mathematics HSC Exam and Solutions booklets available. The booklet will enhance student performance by supporting learning and providing structured revision material. It is strongly recommended that students in Years 12 have a functioning scientific calculator, either a Casio FX 82 or Sharp EL 531for the upcoming exams.

Although year 10 students have about 2 weeks to relax over the holidays and refresh before term 4 begins, the upcoming spring holidays is a great opportunity for students to begin their revision and preparation for the 2010 School Certificate. Students can use these holiday's to gain a competitive advantage over their peers by doing exercises from their textbook or support material from their teacher. In term 4, Year 10 will be completing a Trial School Certificate exam before the main School Certificate exam.

We would also like to welcome to the mathematics staff, Ms Peralta who has been with us this term as part of the UNSW new teacher training placement. Ms Peralta has been teaching Year 7, 8 and 11. Ms Peralta has come to this school in her final year of a combined Bachelor of Science majoring in Mathematics and a Bachelor of Education. She is keen to develop students understanding of the significance of mathematics in a broader context by using practical activates to teach complex concepts.

Students in year 7, 8 and 9 have been issued with end of term take home assignments. Students in year 7 were asked to investigate cultural shapes and designs, and to create tessellations using a variety of shapes. Year 8 and 9 were presented with ICT activities that look to enhance students' ability to create solutions using software programs. The year 8 students are required to choose a 3D shape and draw it using MS Word or FX Draw. They also need to make a model using any suitable material and then determine its surface area and volume. This term, year 9 has been focusing on probability, and their assignment is about the application of experiments and its relationship to probability theory. The year 9 students need to perform an experiment, record the frequency of a coin toss, create a spreadsheet of the results and graph the results on a PIE graph. The assignments were used to assess student understanding of maths literacy.

A number of warning letters have been issued to students, please contact the school to discuss any issues you may have with your sons learning. The Maths faculty encourages students to participate in additional work at home and at school. All teachers are available to provide students with extra support and learning materials. Please encourage your sons to speak to any member of the Maths faculty.


Solar car

Those planning on going to TAFE need to start checking the TAFE New South Wales website www.tafensw to see when their enrolment dates for 2011 are. Year 10 have just had interviews to see what their plans are for their future. Some students are planning on an ATAR pathway (university) and others are looking at a NON-ATAR pathway (TAFE or apprenticeship).
