In the evening Ms Saliba and I had the very great privilege of seeing James receive his award at the Revesby Workers' Club.

Our Cultural Awareness and Anti- Bullying Day was an outstanding success and our thanks must go to the PBIS team, led by Mr Marciniak and including, Ms Adderley, Ms Bhamjee, Mr Odei, Mr Abraham, Mr Rutherford, Ms Cullenward, Mr Collins and Ms Gandouin. The contribution of food from the parents at the school was extremely generous and the food stalls would not have been as delicious without this extraordinary contribution. Performances have been rehearsed for many months now and our thanks are extended to Don Hones, Kehe Liutai, Jake Meadows, Kym Orman and Zoe Mitsopoulos. Kazem had the honour of meeting the Minister for Education and Training the Honourable Ms Verity Firth when he attended the Holroyd High School Multicultural Day. Our Pacific Islander Dance troupe and African Drumming Group were guest entertainers at Holroyd.

The Annual Executive Conference was held on the 13th and 14th of August. The theme of the conference was Effective Pedagogical Leadership. Our guest presenter Mr Rory Gregg aligned our plans with Positive Thinking Skills for Effective Leadership. The Head Teachers led by Mr Brian Miller and myself formulated criteria for lesson observations which align with our school plans.

Some parents have come to me to express their concerns about the lack of parking for dropping students at and picking them up from school. I have been speaking to the Council and as a result the Parramatta Council's Transport Management department will put a recommendation to Council to have the area at the Mary Street entrance to the school as a 5 minute drop off and pick up area. If this proposal is adopted it should be operational in September.

Our Year 12 Parent Teacher Evening was held in Week 4 and parents should now have received their son's report. Year 12 students should now be studying at least 3 hours per evening in preparation for their HSC examination. We have employed Dr Ziad Jomaa, one of our parents, to support students with their studies in Mathematics and Science and Ms Jan Barnett is assisting students with English. Ms Kym Orman, a retired principal from Liverpool Girls, has also been spending some time at school supporting the Year 12 Music students. As well students should take advantage of the homework club that runs on Mondays and Wednesdays at school from 3.00pm to 4.00pm.

Ramadan has begun and I wish those who are observing Ramadan a peaceful month. We look forward to celebrating with you at the Eid dinner to be held at the school in Week 9.

We have much to look forward to before the end of the term. We have been working very productively and boys will be able to participate in a variety of activities within school and outside.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION FOR PARENTS/ GUARDIANS

In 2010 NSW Health is offering <u>diphtheria, tetanus</u> and pertussis (whooping cough) vaccine to Year 7 and Year 10 students free of charge. Only one dose is required and it is being offered to Year 10 students due to recent outbreaks; however, it will not be available to current Year 7 students when they reach Year 10.

Students who missed the first visit by NSW Health Nurses will be able to receive the vaccine in <u>November</u>, so it is imperative that students return the medical forms sent out in week one of this term to Mr Rutherford. Spare forms can be collected from Mr Rutherford at any time.

Additionally, Year 7 students received the first of two doses of the hepatitis B vaccine in July, and will receive their final dose in November. Students who missed out on the <u>hepatitis B vaccine</u> will need see their <u>general</u> <u>practitioner</u>, as this cannot be delivered in a single dose. Finally, Year 7 students will receive a varicella (chickenpox) vaccine in November as well; however, students who have already had chickenpox as a child do not need this vaccine.

Please bring your dTpa (diphtheria, tetanus and pertussis) medical form (and varicella form for Year 7 students) to school IMMEDIATELY.

New Stage 6 Curriculum Offerings for 2011

The NSW Board of Studies (BOS) has developed two new Stage 6 (Yrs.11 & 12) courses in Maths and English. The English course is called English Studies the maths course is called Applied while Mathematics. These courses are designed to provide relevant curriculum for students who do not want to receive an Australian Tertiary Assessment Rank (ATAR) but who want a formal HSC qualification. The content of these courses is not simpler or easier but more vocationally-oriented. This means that their content is aimed more at preparing students for the world of work. One of the main differences is that these courses do not have an HSC exam attached to The assessment is school-based and them. classroom-based and not determined by an external exam like the HSC.

Another planned curriculum enhancement is that GBHS is investigating the possibility of offering the Stage 6 VET course, Hospitality. This course has proved very popular in like schools to ours and would complement the existing suite of VET subjects on offer. If the course went ahead, students would need to travel to another site with an industrial kitchen to satisfy course requirements but since GBHS had its own bus this would not be an issue. The Principal, Linda O'Brien has been lobbying local parliamentary members, both State and Federal for monies so that GBHS can have its own industrial kitchen facility.

Given that the government requires all students to remain at school until they are 17, unless they have fulltime employment or are in a vocational training course like TAFE, these courses are good news. What it means is that students can gain an excellent vocational HSC qualification through a combination of VET courses and the new Maths and English courses. If the right combination of subjects were chosen, the student would not have to sit for the formal HSC exam and endure all the stress but could complete requirements through work placements and in-school assessments. This should provide a real incentive for our boys to stay on and complete the HSC. It is a well known fact that employers prefer more mature apprentices or more mature students who have completed the HSC.

Teacher Professional Learning

The staff at GBHS are currently engaged in a NSW DET Professional Learning course called Teaching English Language Learners (TELL). The course is designed to help teachers cater for students whose language background is not English. As 99% of GBHS students are from a non-English speaking background, this course will give teachers more skills in using a language –based pedagogy. The teachers attend a special staff meeting every third week as well as a timetabled period each fortnight. They all have to submit assessment tasks to qualify for the certificate at the end of the course. To do this, they are all undertaking several grammatical analyses of persuasive texts (arguments) because next year's NAPLAN writing focus will be on persuasive texts. They have explored, in-depth, the issues surrounding reading comprehension and will examine the process of language-based programming and assessment. To the best of my knowledge, it is the first time that all the whole staff from a secondary school in NSW will have completed the TELL course. It is a credit to the teaching staff of GBHS that they are willing to use their time to improve their classroom practices so our bovs learn better.

DEPUTY PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Term 3 has brought with it new professional development opportunities for staff in delivering Information & Communication Technologies to students. During the first day of Term 3, staff participated in professional development sessions, specifically in a session about our school's ICT focus.

During Term 2 I conducted a faculty review looking at how embedding ICT was progressing, resourcing requirements and professional development needs. After analysing the results I formulated what is now Granville Boys' "Phase 2 of ICT" programming. During the first year of an ICT focus we:

- Developed a Mandatory ICT embedding matrix for stage 4 & 5;
- Implemented ICT tasks for all classes in stage 4 & 5;
- Initiated a ICT Steering Committee and application funding model;
- Standardised our ICT infrastructure and piloted the first South West Sydney Regionally supported Virtual Server system.

Phase 2 will now focus on driving up the quality of ICT lessons by working on both the Curriculum and Teacher Professional Development. Curriculum:

- Breaking down the elements of an ICT Activity for scaffolding;
- Grading the skill for each activity
- Publishing the scope and sequence in each key learning area across stages 4 & 5
- Utilising in school application specialists

Teacher Professional Development:

• Skills workshops held for staff after school each week, focusing on a specific skill set linked to their teaching area.

 Access to "Application Specialists" within the school to spread the depth of skills in the staffing pool.

Further to this lessons or sequences of lessons will be graded by levels of difficulty by skill area:

Level 1 - Basic skill set 1 Star
Level 2 - Intermediate skill set 2 Star
Level 3-Advanced / Specialised skill set 3 Star

We have also increased resources for teaching by purchasing:

- A class set of 10 SD Video Cameras for student recording activities;
- A further 5 Interactive Whiteboards for student learning areas.

With a range of new initiatives and resourcing our students will have even greater learning opportunities in the coming months and years.

Subject Selection

We have reached that time of year again where Year 8 and 10 students need to start making decisions about the future. Year 8 will be selecting their elective subjects for Years 9 & 10. Year 10 students will be looking at opportunities for their future including attaining a HSC Certificate by going on to Year 11 & 12 or, studying at TAFE for a future apprenticeship or, attaining an apprenticeship or Full Time work.

During Term 3 all parents of Year 10 students will be interviewed with their son and a future pathway and plan formulated. The Careers Adviser, Year Adviser and a Deputy Principal will look at each students needs and help guide them on a pathway to success.

Our Year 10 Future Connections program that ran over Semester 1 this year was a great success with 9 out of 10 students successfully completing the program. In Semester 2 we have had the opportunity to place a further 5 Year 10 students into a new Future Connections group. These 5 boys are attending TAFE on Wednesdays and Thursdays with 5 other boys from Strathfield South High School. Whilst at TAFE, students are supervised by an Itinerant Support Teacher and completing courses on Sheet metalwork and painting & decorating.

Addressing the needs of students in Year 10 is an important role at GBHS. The Senior Executive team work with the Careers team and parents to ensure students have every opportunity available to them and the most appropriate pathway planned out. We are always looking for programs to help extend students academically and socially to ensure they are a positive influence on our local community

Year 12 Visit to the Australian Museum

On Thursday the 5th of August a group of Year 12 Biology students led by Mr. George went to the Australian Museum in the heart of the city. The students attended a session on the Human Story as part of meeting their syllabus requirements. The students performed a series of hands on activities on different aspects of human evolution. They examined a number of hominid skulls, fossils and modern, to collect data on these features. They also examined how the dental framework of the mouth varied between the ancient and modern humans. However, Mr George reported the highlight of the excursion was when the students got close to the fossil skeleton; 'Lucy'. The students were simply excited because she may have been a biped. If so she was the oldest known fossil of a human ancestor, having lived 3.2 million years ago in east Africa, added Mr. George.

Year 11 Extension, Advanced and Standard English classes are approaching their yearly examinations and should be acting on the advice of their teachers to improve their achievement of the course outcomes.

Year 10 have just completed the Romeo and

MATHEMATICS REPORT

Mr Abas



The Mathletics action research project is now finished and the Maths faculty would like to again thank all students who participated and parents who volunteered their time to be part of the project. The feedback from students and parents was valuable, as it provided information about the implementation of the project, the on-line Mathletics program, and their children's learning habits and interests.

The final action research report was submitted at the beginning of term. The report highlighted some student and teacher improvement in learning and teaching and future ways for improving how things can be done in the faculty.

Mr Pakkiam and Mr Abas presented the outcome of the action research project at the annual Secondary School Engagement Project Conference. Mr Pakkiam spoke about the aims and outcomes of the project and the future use of on-line ICT within the Mathematics Faculty. The summary outcomes of the project include:

- An overall improvement in engagement of lowachieving students
- Increase in teacher confidence and competence with on-line ICT based learning
- Increase quality teaching practice through structured teacher reflection and professional dialogue.

In general, the Faculty will be looking to strengthen teaching practice through:

- The use of dimensions from the NSW Quality Teaching Model
- A clear focus on numeracy and student engagement in the classroom
- Connections with partner high schools to improve students' performance and encourage professional dialogue and learning.

A special thanks to the Community Liaison Officer, Ahmad Dennaoui for assisting the Mathematics Faculty during the evaluation process with parents. The action research project has been a very effective strategy for the school. It has enabled the school to collect information on teaching and learning and consequently plan for improvement across the learning environment.

All students in year 7, 8 and 9 have access from home to the Mathletics. Students who have forgotten their logon details can go to the mathematics staffroom and be issued with another logon. Mathletics is an effective and convenient way for students to support their maths learning at home.

The National Literacy and Numeracy Week in 2010 will be held between the 29th August and 4th September. The week represents a collaborative approach by the Australian Government and the school community to highlight the importance of effective literacy and numeracy skills for all students. This year Granville Boys will join schools from all around Australia in the '**Reach for the stars**' activity.

This is a great opportunity for students to collect, share and investigate data. It provides students with real life mathematics and quality learning through practical activities.

In 2010, the 'Reach for the stars' activity requires students to participate in a national data collection program that will see students collaborating to share and explore data about a simple shuttle run. This will involve four teams of students taking turns to run 20 metres to drop a shuttle into a container and then return to so the next student can take their turn. All teams will put their shuttles in a single container so that the total number of shuttles the class can move in 2 minutes, 4 minutes and 6 minutes can be tallied.

Information about the 'Reach for the stars' activity will be sent to parents during this term. Results from across the country will be shared so that students can undertake activities on data investigation and analysis.

Ms Khan again coordinated the Australian Mathematics Competition. The selection of the Australian Mathematics Competition over other national testing programs is due to the provision of a holistic testing program, which is suitable for students of all abilities. The competition also provides the only pathway to representing Australia at the International Olympiads in Mathematics. The Mathematics Olympiad targets the top 20 per cent of secondary students in Years 7 to 10. The Olympiad provides activities so that talented students can reach their potential. The results of the Australian Mathematics Competition will be available later in the year.



We are fortunate to have Dr Jomaa, who is a specialist mathematician, working with students from across the school. In particular, Dr Jomaa has been supporting the learning of students in Year 12. He has been valuable in improving understanding and encouraging a higher level of

achievement. If parents would like more information about the additional work Dr Jomaa is providing, please contact the school.

We would also like to welcome to the Mathematics staff,

Ms Smith who has been teaching Year 7 and 9. Ms Smith has come to this school from TAFE, where she has extensive experience teaching vocational subiects and graphic design. She is keen to develop students of understanding the significance of mathematics and numeracy in a broader context.



A reminder that the Year 12 General Mathematics HSC Exam and Solutions booklet is available. The booklet is important as it can improve student performance by supporting learning and providing structured revision material. The book will be issued to each Year 12 student once a payment of \$20 is made at the front office and a receipt is presented at the Maths staffroom. The booklet represents very good value as an equivalent resource is well over \$30 from any leading book seller. At the end of term three, students will be using the booklet to work through HSC problems. This includes the application of strategies to engage in questions more effectively, identification of relevant and irrelevant information and techniques on how to structure solutions.

As we are progressing through the final term with Year 12, it is a great opportunity for students to begin their revision and preparation for the 2010 HSC. Students can use this term to gain a competitive advantage over their peers by doing exercises from past HSC exams and the exam revision book. All teachers will be available for extra tuition and support.

It is strongly recommended that students in Years 9, 10 and 11 purchase a scientific calculator. Students should select either the Casio FX 82 or Sharp EL 531. Students from all year levels also require stationary for each lesson. This includes pens, pencils, ruler, sharpener and eraser. As students will be participating in ICT activities, it is suggested that they bring to school a USB flash drive.



The mathematics faculty would like to extend to all the parents, students and staff who will be participating in the fast of Ramadan best wishes, and we hope the month passes with ease.

Year 7 Advisor Mr. Rutherford

This term began a busy term for year 7 students, with vaccinations being held on Monday of week 2. Students were required to get a single dose of the pTpa vaccine (diphtheria, tetanus and pertussis, also known as whooping cough) and the first of two doses of the hepatitis B vaccine. In November, students will receive the second dose of the hepatitis B vaccine, as well as the varicella (chickenpox) vaccine. Students who have had chickenpox as a child do not need this vaccination. Any students who were away or did not bring in the medical form to receive the vaccination are encouraged to do the following:

- Diphtheria, tetanus and pertussis and chickenpox vaccines – can be caught up in November, so it is essential students bring in both medical forms to receive the vaccine;
- Hepatitis B <u>cannot</u> be caught up at school; children will have to see their general practitioner for a three-dose course of the vaccine.

As mentioned previously in the last Bulletin, 7K and a selection of other year 7 students will be going on a rewards excursion for their excellence in attendance and adherence to the school uniform code. Details of this excursion and the permission note will be sent home to parents in the by the end of week 5. Finally, if any parent has a need to contact me about their son's progress, please feel free to call me at school and book a meeting time if necessary. It is not always possible to meet parents when they turn up at school without a booking.

Students have been issued their UAC 2011 Guide and may I suggest that you spend time with your son making yourself familiar with the book and discussing the courses available to him as he will need to select up to 9 courses/institutions before applying online to UAC.

UNIVERSITY UAC News

Year 12 boys have now received their UAC 2011 Guide. More than 1,000 courses are on offer from 17 institutions. The Guide has information about every course, as well as how to apply, and the selection and offer process.

How to Apply?

The only way to apply for courses on offer through UAC for enrolment in 2011 is online through UAC's Apply at www.uac.edu.au.

If students do not have internet access at home they may be able to apply at:

- School
- The local library
- An internet café
- UAC's office at Sydney Olympic Park

Applicants must provide a current email address when they apply. The Apply processing charge for on-time applications is \$25 for year 12 students. The on-time closing date is Thursday 30 September 2010.

SCHOLARSHIPS

Various institutions will be offering scholarships for 2011. Because of the large number, it is advised that you go through the UAC handbook and look at the different institutions that you are thinking of attending and see what scholarships they have to offer. You can also visit the website of institutions and click on prospective students and then access scholarships from there. Also be aware that at some institutions you will automatically be entered onto the relevant scholarship concerning you or that you will need to fill in an application form. Some forms expect you to have a statement from your school Principal so please check scholarship information.

Equity Scholarships

Equity scholarships help students from a low socioeconomic background with the money they need to go or stay at uni. Students can apply for an Equity Scholarships through UAC. The on-time applications should be completed by Thursday 30 September 2010. Students can apply online at <u>www.uac.edu.au/equity/</u> for a number of institutions. For more details on available scholarships students need to download and read the Equity Scholarships 2011 Booklet at <u>www.uac.edu.au/equity/</u>.

Commonwealth Scholarships

The Commonwealth government also provides assistance to students in need. Student Start-up Scholarships and Relocation Scholarships are administered by Centrelink. Students do not have to apply – if they are eligible. Centrelink will pay them directly. Visit www.centrelink.gov.au for more information.

ACCURATE CONTACT DETAILS

UAC needs to have correct contact details for applicants so they can receive important information in a timely manner. A reminder to all Year 12 students to keep their contact details up-to-date. If details change after you have applied, all you need to do is go to Check & Change on UAC's website to update your records. Don't forget to let the front office and Mr Andrews know so that your details can be updated on the Board of Studies website.

THE UAC PINS

A UAC Personal Identification Number (PIN) is the key to applying through UAC and accessing information about an application. The important thing is to keep your UAC PIN in a secure place. NSW HSC students will be issued with a four- digit UAC PIN in the mail in early August. If this PIN number is lost, it can take time to reissue it.

EDUCATIONAL ACCESS SCHEMES (EAS)

Educational Access Schemes are for students who have experienced long-term educational disadvantage. There are a range of disadvantages that students can apply for. The most common ones are attending a disadvantaged school, disrupted schooling, receiving Youth Allowance &/or Parents receiving a pension (financial hardship), personal illness/disability and students working to support themselves. EAS applications will be available mid-August. Students will need to provide proof for the disadvantages they apply for. Closing date for EAS applications is Thursday 30 September 2010.
