PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Ms O'Brien

Impressive NAPLAN growth for GBHS Year 9

Outlined below is a summary of the achievement for Year 9 in this Year's NAPLAN tests. These results are a credit to the students and the teachers. Family support is also appreciated. At the beginning of the year teachers from the Learning Services faculty met with all boys and their families to discuss an Individual Plan for Numeracy and Literacy. Part of this plan was to improve the communication between home and school about student performances in literacy and numeracy and to develop a home study program to compliment what was happening at school. I think the table below is proof that the plan is working.

2011 data reflects an overall improvement in moving students out of the lowest bands in each aspect of the test.

A comparison between data in 2009 and 2011 reflects:

- 1. Reading improvement by 14%
- 2. Writing cannot be compared due to a change in genre
- 3. Spelling improvement by 18%
- 4. Grammar and Punctuation improvement by 22%
- 5. Numeracy improvement by 5%

We look forward to future growth in student learning outcomes at our school. We need to work towards having all students achieve at or above National Standards.

The School Plan

Our school plan has been drafted and is now ready for consultation from parents and students. We look forward to seeing you at the next P&C meeting to discuss the plan and to receive your input. In 2012 we join the National School Partnership which will mean that we will receive additional funding. As mentioned before this plan aligns with the National Reforms for Education in Low SES partnerships. These are listed below:

- 3. innovative and flexible school operational arrangements
- 4. tailored learning opportunities for students
- 5. strengthened school accountability to parents and the community, and
- 6. external partnerships with parents, schools, businesses and local communities

During the second half of this term, three of our staff members, Mr Hoang (Mathematics), Mrs Rodriguez (TAS Food Tech) and Ms R. Woods (PDHPE) participated in professional development training with other secondary and primary school teachers from our local area. The focus of the professional development was to produce a series of lessons for students moving from Year 6 to Year 7. The lessons that were developed will assist Year 6 students to learn some of the fundamental skills that are necessary in Year 7. Students from our local primary school will be attending Granville Boys High School as part of their learning transition later in term four. The teachers that participated in the professional development stated that it was a fantastic opportunity to work with teachers from different schools to develop these creative learning programs.

Also this term eleven of our staff attended Auburn Girls High School to participate in Gifted and Talented training. Staff were nominated from all faculties to develop their understanding and skills in the identification of Gifted and Talented students as well as how to develop lessons and programs that would further engage these students. The Gifted and Talented training of staff will further enhance the quality of teaching skills that our staff have to deliver engaging lessons not only for the students who will be selected for next years enrichment class, but for all students at the school.

In week four I went through the process of reviewing all of the year 12 reports and organising one on one interviews with students and their parents, to provide feedback regarding their progress. It was pleasing to report back to parents how well many of the students were performing. Although there is still room for improvement we have many students who are on track to receiving some very good HSC results. Many of the Year 12 teachers will be running holiday workshops for students during the holidays and I strongly encourage students to make the most of these opportunities. This year 12 will be having a formal on the evening of their graduation at Granville RSL. It will be an opportunity for staff, students and parents to have a final meal together. DEPUTY PRINCIPAL REPORT

Term 3 was particularly busy, with students in Yr 8 and Yr 10 making important decisions about future pathways in education and training.

Mr Egan, Mr Hyrce, Ms Bailey and myself spent 3 days interviewing Yr 10 students and parents about their future career path after school and helped ensure the correct subjects are selected for 2012 - 2013. Parents were very pleased with the inclusive process with many positive comments, also many siblings commented on the fact that they were never given such useful advice during their schooling. We will be confirming enrolments in subjects during Term 4 and communicate this information home to parents.

Teacher Professional Learning is always a priority at GBHS. Staff across the school have been developing integrated learning units that are engaging and student cantered. These integrated learning units involve multiple subjects being integrated into a large learning project, meaning students learn about and then apply specific key learning area knowledge and skills within the context of one large learning project. We are trialing this process with Yr 8 in 2012, students will experience one learning project per term.

At the beginning of September I had the opportunity to attend the Fifth Annual National IWB conference in Melbourne. There were many great presenters from around the country and excellent local and international keynotes. Of particular interest was Ramona Pierson. who spoke about innovation shifting the paradigm so that schools adjust to meet the needs of the current cohort. The conference gave us valuable information to utilize within our school, but more importantly has allowed us to assess what we are currently doing and planning to do against schools from across the country. As teachers responsible for providing a quality individual education for each student we need to examine trends in education and select the best for our students. American educators and researchers have such huge issues within their schools that technology is being developed to automate mathematics and science learning, allowing self paced student learning. The teachers' role is to monitor usage and then individually support students struggling with particular concepts. Early inceptions of this process are already in use in America, Canada and soon in Australia.

Each student is different, their education needs to be individually designed and monitored. This shifts away from the idea that the learning process is linear, we need flexibility in our curriculum to allow individuals to explore through learning. With the preparation of integrated learning in 2012 we are on the right path.

Sydney Jewish Museum and was the second of a three part series of intercultural and interfaith dialogue. Devised by the NSW Jewish Board of Deputies Education Secretariat, the program facilitates collaboration between students from a diversity of communities from around Sydney. This event featured interactive sessions with Jewish, Muslim, Armenian, Aboriginal and Catholic speakers. The main focus was on anti-racism and cultural exchange, and students met for a day of discussion and multimedia performances.

Another program Granville Boys will be involved with is the 'Face to Faith' project. Already active in 16 countries around the world, Face to Faith is a compelling school curriculum that engages students of different faiths in meaningful inter and intra-faith dialogue across a range of cultures.

Face to Faith is designed to encourage young people to recognise the similarities between faiths and more importantly to respect and deal with the differences between diverse and sometimes conflicting worldviews. By learning about those of differing social, cultural and religious perspectives, young people build their awareness of the role of faith in their lives and in the lives of others.

Currently, Face to Faith is aimed at 11-16 year olds. Schools in the UK, US, Canada, India, Pakistan, Singapore, Indonesia, Lebanon, Palestine, Jordan, UAE, Egypt, Philippines, Israel, Italy and Australia are currently engaged in the program. Granville Boys have begun the process of engaging in the program. About 10 students will be selected for the initial trial video conference with Moriah College in November.

In 2012, the year 10 School Certificate qualifications will be scrapped and replaced with another exit credential which reports student achievements up until the time they leave school, whether it is at the end of year 10 or part-way through year 11 or 12. These changes affect the current year 8 students, which have been participating in the year 9 and 10 subject selection process.

At Granville Boys' all Years 9 and 10 students are required to study English, Mathematics, Science, Geography, History and Personal Development, Health and Physical Education and participate in Sport. Students will be placed into the Mathematics Course that is most appropriate for their capabilities. Mathematics may be studied at Advanced, Intermediate or General level. Placement into these levels will be the responsibility of the Head of Mathematics after consultation with the Mathematics teachers. There are no levels within English, Science, Human Society and its Environment and Personal Development, Health and Physical Education.

At some time during Years 7-10, students are also required to study courses in Creative Arts, Technology and Applied Studies and Languages Other Than English. The year 8 students can select three elective courses in Years 9 and 10. Every effort will be made to offer the courses chosen, but course availability is determined by demand. It is important for students in year 9 and 10 to consider carefully their selection, as the subjects offered in year 9 and 10 form the basis for the courses of study offered for the Higher School Certificate.

When considering subjects for year 9, students should think about their ability, interests, motivation and possible career aspirations. So as this is the first time students have had the opportunity to select their subjects, they should select carefully, as subjects extend over 2 years and to change is difficult, sometimes impossible.

Prestigious Science Award



HSIE REPORT

Over the last four weeks students in Year 8 and 9 have been working on a number of assessment tasks that have been designed using the peer coaching model. The HSIE teachers used their PAS period to plan and develop a lesson on a different aspect of natural disasters. Mr Bellavia introduced the topic of natural disasters through a short video clip of a tsunami loosely based on events in Indonesia. Ms Kirin then went on to look at the economic, political and social effects of tsunamis. Ms Ghosh together with the boys looked at what services could an individual call on to get support. With Mr Fraser the students interacted with ICT programs to create posters on line that a government and non government organisation could use in emergency situations. Students are now creating a web site based on the types of natural disasters found in Australia.

In other news the teachers of Year 9 History are completing an assignment on the soldiers who enlisted in Granville and who fought in World War One. Our starting point is the monument on Railway Parade and the local Historical Society who have been a great help and have been fantastic with the sharing of their resources. Thank you to Mr Reijerink who has helped put the project together.

Thank you to the support of the year 7 parents who have helped their sons complete an assignment on the physical and human environmental features. We are really impressed with the effort that has gone into producing these posters.

Year 8 students have been investigating Aboriginal contact history and have created their own PowerPoint presentations on traditional Aboriginal societies. Many of the students have again put a lot of effort into their work and in some classes students have marked the work of their classmate.

The faculty would like to wish all the year 12 boys a safe, relaxing but ultimately study focused break before their final exams. Many of the boys I have spoken to this week are committed to doing their best through the thorough revision of their work notes over the school holidays. The year 12 HSIE teachers are looking forward to catching up with students over the two week study break (not holiday) in order to further revise and plan for the exams.

ENGLISH REPORT

Term three draws to a close with year 11 and 10 students undertaking yearly examinations/trial school certificate examinations. Preliminary students should be spending some time over the vacation preparing for

their study of their first HSC module. Advanced English students will be undertaking the study of Shakespeare's and two other texts of their own Julius Caesar choosing, for Module C: Representation and Text: Elective 1: Conflicting Perspectives. These students will have the opportunity to view a Bell Shakespeare production of Julius Caesar at the Sydney Opera House late in term 4. Standard students will be reading selected poems written by Douglas Stewart for Module Experience through language: Elective Distinctively Visual. Both Advanced and Standard candidates should ensure they have a copy of their text to read during the vacation so they are prepared for class study at the beginning of term 4. Preliminary English Studies students will also commence the HSC pattern of study next term.

Year 9 will complete their study of Survival at the end of this term. They have been undertaking a number of activities of their choice in class and many students have produced exemplary work for this unit. Activities have ranged from comprehension guides and oral recounts to sophisticated photo-stories and movie trailers. Year 8 students have had a great time blocking scenes from Shakespeare's Macbeth with their class as the audience and learning about the impact of superstition and witchcraft on English life in the 16th century. They have completed a range of activities from vocabulary building and comprehension guides to character representation and interpretation. Year 7 students are, also, undertaking the study of a famous Shakespeare comedy, As You Like It and completing a variety of tasks around issues ranging from the importance of the stage and the role of the audience to the representation of characters and the way this play is still valued today, 400 years after it was first performed.



Last but certainly not least, we wish our 2011 HSC candidates the very best of luck for the English Advanced and Standard examinations – paper I on Tuesday, 18th October, 2011 and paper II on Wednesday, 19th October, 2011. The year 12 English teachers will continue to facilitate revision during class time for the rest of this term and during week 1 in term

4. Keep those practice essays coming in for teacher feedback!

Standard English candidates will have the opportunity to attend a revision workshop run by Ms Gandouin at school in week 2 of the school vacation on Wednesday 5th October and there will be a workshop for Advanced candidates in week 1 of the school vacation on Tuesday and Wednesday, 27th and 28th September, 2011.

Subject selection for 2012

The students found the activities thoroughly engaging and enjoyed the change from the traditional Mathematics lessons. Students were awarded points for skill, enthusiasm and cooperation many students won competition prizes. Congratulations to all the winners.

Another component of the Numeracy awareness week is the Poster competition. The final date for submission of the poster has been extended to Wednesday 12 October to allow students to tap into their creativity during the school break. Details of the competition are given below.

HSC Tutorials

HSC tutorials have been running in Maths since the beginning of this term for all interested General Mathematics students. These lessons are free. Thank you to their teacher, Mr Hoang who has devoted Wednesday and Thursday afternoons after school to prepare students for HSC by going through past exam questions and other related content. All students doing General Maths are welcome to attend these classes and benefit from the revision schedule. Other Maths teachers have been offering help to students in the mornings and during recess and lunch breaks.

During the term 3 school break, the Maths faculty will run a HSC tutorial day on Tuesday 27th September from 9am to 2pm. A number of teachers will be available on the day to help students with their exam preparation in Maths. Students are encouraged to make the most of this opportunity.

Homework

Most students are producing work of a high standard in class and must be commended for their effort. Some students however, need to develop in this area. It is very important that students do all homework, class

work and



assignments that are set by their teachers as these contribute towards their final assessment mark. Their attitude to learning, work ethic and progress would determine the class they will be placed in next year. Parents can encourage their son to develop good study habits by supporting and encouraging them to study at

home, to come thoroughly prepared for lessons, and to complete all home work efficiently. Parents must contact school if they are concerned about any aspect of their child's learning, and particularly if the child does not bring home work.

Poster making Competition

The poster making competition is open to all students from years 7 to 12. Students are to design a poster that demonstrates Mathematics in real life There will be three prizes, (Vouchers) for the 1st, 2nd and 3rd best posters. A panel of judges will be nominated to determine the winning entries. All students who would like to participate in the competition must register their interest by writing their names on the registration sheet in the Maths Faculty.

Criteria for making the Poster

Theme: Mathematics in real life

- Posters must have features that promote Mathematics. It must incorporate a theme that showcases Mathematics in a real life scenario e.g. food, transport, sport. etc.
- Posters must be on hard paper and approx. 60cm by 50cm in measurement.
- Students are allowed to use any material to make their posters (pencil, paint, crayons, coloured pencils, etc)
- Students are allowed to use internet or other sources to research their theme; however the final product must be the student's own work.
- Entries must be handed to a staff member in the Mathematics faculty by the due date.
- All entries will be displayed in the faculty


Real-life experiences
