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

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT Ms O'Brien

The class of 2012 has graduated and we shall miss them. They are a fine group of dedicated students who strongly supported their school and took care of the younger students. I am sure we will be celebrating with them soon when the HSC results come.

Meanwhile we have had a busy wind down to the term. Accolades have been flowing into the school for our Year 7 and 8 Concert Band. The boys have performed in Our Spectacular at the Opera House. We have included in this Bulletin the article that was in The Sun Herald. Bernard Zuel, the music critic visited the school and was delighted by the rehearsal and the cooperation of the students. He emailed to say how impressed he was. His article generated comments from diverse members of the community as far as Wollongong. All comments were complimentary and have been passed on to students at the Assembly. I was so very proud of the achievements of our students.

The school is one of 229 across NSW that is taking part in the National Partnership between the State and Federal Governments, Empowering Local Schools. The partnership gives us an opportunity to build the capacity of the school to serve the community. Towards that end we welcome input from our parents and citizens and hope to have more involvement in school governance. We have been granted \$50 000 to spend on the improvements to school government and improvements to school infrastructure.

We are pioneering the introduction of the new accounting and administrative systems that are being introduced in the Department of Education ad Communities, entitled Learning Management and Business Review, (LMBR). Already we have attended a workshop for the new Budget and Planning Tool.

Students transitioning to our great school have been our guests during the term. Mr Bellavia and his Year 10 Elective History Class have hosted Year 6's from Auburn West Public when the Year 6 students exhibited their personal archives. Year 6 students chose things from home that represented them and would explain who they were. Year 10 students mentored these amateur historians and meanwhile had a great time. Mr Marciniak and Mr Hardcastle have been working collaboratively with Blaxcell Street, Auburn North, Granville public schools and Auburn North and Granville South Creative and Performing Arts. We are looking forward to meeting students at our school.

The NAPLAN results which head our Bulletin are very impressive. Thanks to the staff and students at our great school who have worked so hard to make 2012 a great year.

DEPUTY PRINCIPAL REPORT Mr. Marciniak

Early this term Ms Libdy and I conducted an interview panel to elect a Year advisor for 2014. The role will be a particularly interesting one in2014 we will receive our first cohort of selective students. There were five outstanding internal applicants applying for the position. All applicants demonstrated a comprehensive understanding of the role and great empathy to the welfare needs of our students. However one applicant stood out above the rest and accepted the position on offer. I am pleased to announce that Mrs M. Ioannidis from the Science faculty will be GBHS' Year 7 Advisor and Mr S. Pakkiam will be her assistant for 2014. Mr Pakkiam will take up the duties of being Year 7 Advisor 2015. Congratulations to them both and we are confident they will do a marvellous job as Year Advisors.

As part of our ongoing commitment to student learning, and providing students with a voice, GBHS has formed a Student Voice Group consisting of year 7 and 8 students, twenty in total. Students were elected by nominations from their peers in a ballot process.

Students with the most nominations were elected into the Student Voice group. Students electing their peers were asked to explain why they believed that the person they were nominating would benefit or how they would be beneficial contributors to the group. Students nominating responses varied from: "it would improve their learning", "that they have good ideas", "that they are a good learner", "that they have good ideas but are not focused in class".

The maturity that all the Year 8 and 9 students displayed in the information and nomination processes was very impressive and their work so far has been extraordinary. Students so far have participated in two sessions that have focused on working through the process of developing their skills and understanding action research. In session one student's investigated evidence and gathered information about evidence to deduce a hypothesis. In the second session students observed action research questioning techniques and ranked feedback on participants' agreement. The students focus and concentration was remarkable and the students learnt a lot from the session.

On Wednesday the 7th of November GBHS hosted the Minister of Fair Trading Mr Anthony Roberts in launching a mobile phone app for students who were purchasing a motor vehicle. The Minister was accompanied by our local member for Granville Mr Tony Issa. This was a great opportunity for our school to showcase our exceptional behaviour and hospitality that has become synonymous with our school. The minster was extremely impressed with the students and especially the school captain and prefects who greeted the minister and spoke to him freely about our great school. He enjoyed a coffee from the school Café and remarked that it was the best coffee he has ever had. He was invited back to drop in for a coffee any time.



DEPUTY PRINCIPAL REPORT Mr Abas

The National Partnership Evaluation was completed early this term and looked at the changes in the schools' systems and practices, which are a consequence of the partnership in 2012. The following were highlighted as significantly impacting school function, which led to improved learning outcomes for students.

The school leadership framework 'Platform for Collaborative Education' developed in conjunction with the current school planning cycle advocated professional learning that was centered on the local learning environment, based on staff sharing experiences and expertise, and focused on encouraging teachers to speak about the teaching and learning at the school. Although the teachers attitude towards professional learning changed prior to the National Partnership, there has been an ongoing genuine commitment to professional learning by staff, which has seen many teachers nominating for project work, peer leadership of professional learning and sharing of planning implementation collaborative and of innovative learning programs.

Again, although the process of transforming the school culture commenced prior to the start of the National

Partnership, as a direct result of the National Partnership funding, school culture and climate has continued to impact staff collaboration, professional learning and non-executive leadership opportunities. The educational model at the school encourages staff to communicate and collaborate more effectively and supports a planning and development culture that is focused around an ideal 'learning space'.

The focus in 2012 has been on translating the teacher professional learning experiences to student learning around collaboration, planning, problem solving and risk taking. The educational focus at the school on project based learning in the form of integrated learning projects has provided students with more meaningful learning experiences. The expansion of the educational methodology to a variety of learning modes including in-faculty collaboration, faculty-to-faculty and multifaculty learning in 2013 will provide further opportunities to improve student-learning experiences.

The most tangible change has been in the student improvement in NAPLAN. In the last two years, there has been a significant increase in the number of students achieving their expected minimum growth target in all areas of NAPLAN. The significance of this achievement was evident in the 2012 year 9 results where the school achieved the highest rank in the SEG for the student value-add score in all areas of NAPLAN.

Over the past two years, the school has been continually reviewing NAPLAN preparation and planning. In the past, the NAPLAN preparation process has included student and parent interviews, Intensive literacy withdrawals, literacy and numeracy home booklets, and numeracy skills lessons. However, in 2012 with the commencement of the National Partnership and the additional funding for staffing, the school embarked on a review process of learning in stage 4 across all curriculum areas so that any overlap in content and assessment could be identified. The curriculum mapping project was conceived to provide teachers with a capacity to improve literacy and numeracy programming and assessment by connecting learning from across the school in more meaningful way. The current objective of this project is to develop more effective learning activities that embed writing, reading comprehension, speaking and analysis skills within classroom learning and assessment.

The Literacy Team has successfully trialled the ACER Progressive Achievement Test (PAT) for students in year 7 and 8. The PAT test will be used to track student progress from year to year and provide diagnostic information to inform teaching and learning. The test is being used primarily to determine the effect of teaching and learning on student performance and improvement and information on student skills and knowledge. The initial diagnostic testing process for students in stage 4 will also include the numeracy component of the testing. The current Year 8 students will be tested later this term to complete the stage 4 learning cycle before they enter year 9 and the current year 7 students will be tested at the start of term 1 in 2013.

The school has also commenced the NAPLAN preparation program for students in year 8. The program includes intensive support for students who are identified as needing assistance in reading and writing. The school Literacy and Numeracy Teams have also prepared learning booklets that will be sent home with the students to support classroom learning. The learning booklets have been designed to support literacy and numeracy learning progressively over a number of terms. The first book was issued at the start of term 4 and students should receive three more booklets before the end of the term. The completed booklets must be returned to the school to verify that they have been completed. The learning booklets are being distributed and collected each week by Ms Khan and Mr Pakkiam. Please encourage your boys to attend the homework club every Monday and Wednesday afternoon between 3pm and 4pm.

Over the summer holiday, the Literacy and Numeracy Teams will be providing students with a learning booklet and material to encourage reading. In term 1 2013, all students completing the holiday learning booklet and reading program will enter a draw for a significant prize. They will also participate in the deputy principal excursion later in the term. Also in term one the Head Teacher Learning Services and myself will conduct interviews with year 9 parents and students. The interviews will provide parents with information on student performance in Literacy and Numeracy and options for improving student learning outcomes.

Year 10 students have completed the subject selection process for 2013. The process was a great opportunity to hear what students felt about school and career options. Students were given the opportunity to discuss various career options and subject choices regardless of whether they want to go to university, or to pursue a trade or apprenticeship. The subject selection process is about targeting subjects that will allow the student to succeed. Students will receive a letter outlining their final choices in the coming weeks. Parents are expected to sign and return the subject selection confirmation letter to confirm the student entry into year 11 in 2013. Please contact me if you have any questions about this process.

In the PAS (fortnightly faculty professional learning) periods, staff has continued to apply the concept mapping process and the mnemonic writing tools developed by Literacy Team to learning and assessment for year 8 and 9. The PDPHE, Mathematics, English and HSIE faculties are preparing to trial new learning and assessment activities for writing and speaking this term. The faculties have integrated the literacy task into teaching programs so that the student experiences literacv learning in context with curriculum expectations of each faculty. Ms Bendeich from English and the Literacy Team will support the learning of the mnemonic writing tool in each class by team teaching the technique to students.

Other faculties have been enhancing their Literacy learning material to ensure their alignment to school priorities and Literacy and Numeracy team targets. Further work is being developed through the Learning teams in the form of project based learning and integrated learning tasks. The development of learning material in PAS and the Learning Teams will include a variety of learning modes and styles including visual, aural, verbal and physical learning experiences and assessments.



As the 'Platform for Collaborative Education' encourages continual reflection and analysis of student performance and achievement, the Literacy and Numeracy teams are looking to develop consistent faculty specific and whole school learning strategies and resources. Currently, the teams are in the process of developing writing tools and reading strategies and resources for targeted literacy and numeracy learning for all faculties. As part of this process, the Literacy Team has recognised the need for specific reading and writing professional learning programs that build on the learning from the Teaching English Language Learners (TELL) program.

The Literacy Team has commenced the Accelerated Literacy training this term. The Accelerated Literacy program will broaden teacher understanding of reading and writing strategies. The teachers being trained have commented that Accelerated Literacy is more than about spelling, grammar and vocabulary it is about ways of thinking and, the what, how, when, where and why, of language choices in text. The Literacy Team also invited Dr David Rose from Sydney University to present an overview of his program called 'Reading to Learn'. The aim of Reading to Learn is to support every student in a class to read and write challenging texts at their gradelevel. The Literacy Team is looking to develop a professional learning program around the 'Reading to Learn' program in 2013.

Welcome to Term 4. This Term is very busy in the sense that many of the programs that we have been running throughout the year are nearing completion.

The Goals program is coming to an end for this year. The students have had their last session on November the 1st at KPMG. The closing ceremony will be held at our school on Thursday the 22nd of November. The Mentors and Auburn Girls will join us to celebrate the end of another Goals season. The students will also have an opportunity to thank their Mentors. I would also like to take this opportunity to thank Mr Pakkiam for stepping in and taking the students to the Goals sessions when I was unable to attend due to prior commitments at work. The students gained invaluable confidence and skills that can be used throughout their lives.

Links to Learning is also nearing completion. This program ran every Tuesday with Year 16 Year 10 students.

Last Term and the start of this term, I took 16 Year 10 students to Sydney University for Peer Mediation Training. This program was facilitated by Abe from YPI (Youth Peace Initiative). It ran for three days. The students are now trained as peer mediators and we will use them to help resolve any conflict that may arise at school between younger students.

The students are to be congratulated on their behaviour and their eagerness to participate in all the activities.

Abe will ensure that the boys training will remain current by visiting with them at least twice a term.

They will also be utilised next year as peer mentors for the 2013 Year 7 cohort.

In week 4 we started the parent program 'living with teenagers'. I encourage all parents to attend this workshop as it will help you work through issues that

you may have with your teenage children. This workshop is held in the common room every Tuesday from 9:30-11:30. It is facilitated by Mary-Anne from Auburn Youth Centre. It runs for six weeks.

We will endeavour to run it again in 2013, if it proves to be successful.

Mr Abas and I are in the process of organising a video conference for the 15th of November, with multicultural and multi-faith schools from around NSW. This initiative is part of the Youth Peace Initiative. This is a very exciting venture for our school and our students.

On Friday the 9th of November Year 10 students attended Cabramatta High school to listen to Senator Sakai Holland who is the 2012 recipient of the Sydney Peace Prize.

On Wednesday the 7th of November our students attended Sydney Town hall to listen to Senator Sakai Holland deliver the annual City of Sydney Peace Prize Lecture.

Our students are very fortunate to be provided with these fantastic opportunities.

This is a reflection of the quality of the school. Many Community and Government organisations are actively providing our school and the students with leadership opportunities which raise expectations.

Students participating in past events have commented on how valuable and exciting these opportunities have been and how they have made them much more confident and willing to participate in extracurricular activities.

Control who sees your profile You can edit your settings from the privacy page which gives you control over what visitors to your profile see and you can also control who can see your details too.

<u>Harassment</u>

If you've got a Facebook account and you're getting unwelcome contact or harassment from people you've fallen out with, tell them to stop.

You can also block people by using the "Block People" box on the My Privacy page. If you block someone they can't see your profile and if they search for you then you are invisible.

You can also control how much people see about you by setting up a "Limited Profile". To do this, go to the "My Privacy Page" after logging on and click on the "Limited Profile Settings" link.

Choose the profile features you want other people to see and what you want to share, like pictures, and click "Save" to store the new settings. You can also add confirmed friends to the limited profile network by listing their names in the limited profile box.

Report trouble

If people don't stop making offensive postings, you can use the "Report" link which is on the Facebook pages to make a complaint. There's more info on this on http://www.facebook.com/help/?safety#!/help/?safety=p arents

Facebook pledges to investigate the complaint and to remove the content and warn or ban the offender from the site within 24 hours. If you email Facebook you should get a reply within 72 hours telling you what they have done about the problem.

Close your Facebook account

To deactivate your Facebook accounts go to the "settings" tab on the Account page. That will remove your profile and content and nobody will be able to see your details or search for you. But if you decide to reinstate the account later then the whole lot will be restored, including your friends and photos.

The days are warming up and the roses at the front gate are in bloom, a celebratory time of year for students and teachers alike. It has been an eventful term so far in the English faculty. A new Head Teacher, in Peter Budnik, is at the helm and plans are already afoot to see just how much we as a faculty can compact into the final term of the year.

Year 12 Advanced and Standard students have completed their HSC English examinations and we wish them all the best for their results and future plans. Mr Egan and Ms Gandouin are busily marking HSC Paper 1, which will enable them to gain a greater insight into helping students achieve in their HSC examinations.

Year 11 have now commenced their first HSC modules, this being effectively their first term of Year 12. The Advanced class are studying Frankenstein and Blade Runner as the prescribed texts for their first module. Year 12 Standard are currently studying the poetry of Douglas Stewart for Module A, while English Studies are working on a module entitled The Big Screen – English in Film Making. All students are encouraged to keep up their hard work.

A number of exciting excursions and workshops have also taken place, with more to come. Year 12 students attended Belvoir Street Theatre to see a play called Private Lives, whereas junior students attended a piece of modern dance at the Parramatta River Side Theatre entitled The Yard. Year 10 have been wrapping up a truth and justice unit based on the film text The Hurricane. Soon, they will begin revising for their end of year examinations, consolidating their understanding of text types and language devices. The Year 9 cohort has been working on a unit based on the poetry of Douglas Stewart. This module has been received with great enthusiasm, and will benefit the students greatly as it helps them become more confident identifying and analysing poetic techniques.

During term 4 HSIE faculty members has been active in a number of areas.

Students in year 7 have been studying the middle Ages this term all Year 7 students will have the opportunity to watch and participate in a Middle Ages day. Students have the opportunity to dress up as knights and wear replica suit of armor and handle replica tools. The more risk takers in the year also get a chance to hang around in a pillory or on the rack.

Before the close of term the HSIE faculty submitted an application to Parramatta Council for one thousand dollars. This was to upgrade the facilities for the school chickens and expand on the market garden begun by Mr Marciniak and Mr Hryce last year. Mr Heiler recently received confirmation of our successful application and has already begun acquiring the necessary tools and organizing his team of boys to visit Strathfield Council to look into establishing an indigenous garden as part of the proposal.



MATHEMATICS REPORT Ms Ram

Term 4 in the Mathematics faculty is an extremely busy one. This is the time when the junior students have their final assessments and teachers write their yearly reports giving an overview of the students' performance for the year. For year 8 students, these cumulative assessments determine their placement into the year 9 classes for 2013. In year 9 next year, there will be three pathways. Students who qualify for Pathway 5.3 would be able to do Mathematics and/or Mathematics Extension 1 in year 11. Students who are chosen for Pathway 5.2 would be capable of doing Mathematics and/or General Mathematics in year 11. Those students who enter the Pathway 5.1 course would be able to do either General Mathematics 1 and/or General Mathematics 2 in year 11.

For students who aspire to go to university for tertiary education, particularly to do Engineering, Medicine and Aviation, to mention a few, need to do Pathway 5.3 in years 9 and 10, to be able to do Mathematics Extension 1 in years 11 and 12. Parents can support and encourage their son's educational endeavors to achieve to his potential. They can help by setting high expectations for success, monitoring homework, assignments and course work, or by just being there to talk to their children about learning.

In weeks 6 and 7 of this term, the year 11's who are now in the first term of their HSC coursework will sit for their first HSC assessment task. It is thus imperative that the students prepare themselves thoroughly for these tasks as it will contribute towards the quality of their HSC grade. Students can access help with their school work and homework by attending the homework centre in the library on Mondays and Wednesdays. If students need specific help with Mathematics, they need to put their names down on the board in the Maths faculty and a teacher will be available to help them on Thursday afternoons from 3pm to 4 pm. This year the faculty has also begun to offer Mathematics Extension 2 at school.

Australian Mathematics Competition

In August this year a group of 16 students participated in the Australian Mathematics Competition which is a prestigious National competition in which our boys usually perform quite well. Three students achieved credits, six achieved proficiency while the others were awarded participation certificates. Those students who missed out this year would get another opportunity to participate in the AMC in 2013. Registration dates will be advertised early in term 1 next year.

The Mathematics faculty and the Numeracy team have looked at the NAPLAN test data for 2012. The data indicates a positive outcome for Granville Boys. In Numeracy, there is a significant improvement in the quality of achievement across the school. Parents can utilize the NAPLAN result given to their son to help and guide with their son's revision and remedial work.

Mathletics

In 2013, Mathletics will again be available to students to provide extra help and resources for developing their mathematical potential. Since the school license will be renewed, students' passwords would remain active over the holidays and can be utilized to get a head start in their preparation for next year.

LEARNING SUPPORT TEAM REPORT Mrs Adderley

There have been a lot of different faces in the Learning Services Faculty this year. This term we are continuing on with intensive reading, however, a new group of students will be starting. We are also starting intensive numeracy classes. Many students are receiving extra assistance through faculty staff and many of the university students that we have coming into the school.

The Learning Services faculty has been very excited that Granville Boys High School is continually improving their NAPLAN scores. In order to assist this continued growth this term we have assessed all students who received band four or below in reading. We will also be assessing all students who received band four or below in the other NAPLAN areas. With the testing results the faculty aims to help individual student to improve their literacy and numeracy results.

The Library continues to be a hive of activity, with teachers and university students working with individual students, small groups of students and whole classes. It is very exciting to see the level of learning that is taking place. This term we even had a group of students working on a short film that they wrote which is set in a school library. Mr Chebib will be organising the Premiers Reading Challenge excursion that many of the students will be on. If you feel that your son / ward is having difficulties with his school work please feel free to contact me. Homework club is running on Monday and Wednesday afternoons for student from 7 to 12. On Tuesday afternoon from 1.00pm till 2.30 we are running a year 12 tutorial and supported study session. University students attend these sessions in order to support year 12 students.

TEACHING & LEARNING Ms Cullenward

Urban Renewal Project

Years 7/8 in the Enrichment class are trialing the Integrated Learning Project this term through the KLAs of English, Maths, HSIE and Visual Arts.

So far, the students have been on an excursion to the Clyde Industrial area along Duck River to make an assessment of the area and consider the infinite number of possibilities there are for urban renewal there. They then visited the Zetland area to view the significant urban development that has already taken place there to cater for the changing needs of the area – such as an influx of young families. They were able to see first-hand how the town planners/designers were able to incorporate heritage buildings into the new design, how community vegetable gardens, parkland and play equipment are important features in catering for young families.

The students were most fortunate in having a visit from a town planner, Mr Lay, who talked to them about the process of planning urban redevelopments. Mr Lay will return at the completion of the projects so that the boys may present their group projects to him. It is a wonderful opportunity for the students to experience authentic (real-life) learning and assessment.

The evaluation for last term's project, *Game On!* was carried out by our numeracy consultant, Ms. Lay. The teachers involved in the

Project and a focus group of students from 8A, were asked to create individual surveys and then participate in a group interview which was videoed. The teacher and the student responses were very positive and students rated their understanding of what they had to do highly, as well as the benefits of working in a group. The students were able to articulate the range of new skills they learnt during the project – curriculum knowledge as well as ways of learning.

A short version of these student video responses to all the Integrated Learning Projects undertaken this year will be uploaded to the school website during term 4.

Peer Coaching Program

The Peer Coaching program finished term 3 with the Peer Coach Leaders participating in professional development for a day during which they worked on a unit of work for stage 4 students to improve the engagement of the students in both teaching and learning sequences and to improve student achievement of learning outcomes through assessment methods. They reviewed the process of coaching, the Quality Teaching Framework and curriculum differentiation tools and what the implementation of these look like in the classroom.

So far this term, the Peer Coach Leaders have focused on using the IRIS hardware and software to video the teaching/learning in the classroom. They have used the video to reflect individually and collaboratively on their teaching practice and are in the process of introducing this process to their peers – the teaching staff at GBHS. These reflections will give all the teachers the tools to identify their own areas for further improvement. The school policy and protocols for using video in the classroom will be uploaded onto the school website soon for parents to reference. If your son wishes he can choose a seat in the classroom which is out of the range of the camera.

The Peer Coach Leaders are continuing to work with their peers on concept mapping -a tool for programming curriculum differentiation -a well as individually identified areas for further improvement.

Term 4 promises to be just as busy and exciting as term 3 with so many wonderful projects happening at GBHS.

HEAD TEACHER MENTOR Ms Faddoul

It has been another very busy year for New Scheme Teachers (NSTs) at Granville Boys High School. This year I have been working with six NSTs to gain mandatory accreditation with the NSW Institute of Teachers; Mr Heiler in HSIE, Mr Chebib in Learning Support/PDHPE, Ms Richardson in TAS, Mr Khoury in Science, Ms Bendeich in English, Ms Havea in TAS.

NSTs Submitting Accreditation:

NSTs have been active participants in the Beginning Teacher Program run after school focusing on a variety of Professional Learning areas. These areas have included:

- Establishing Classroom Routines
- Behaviour Management Approaches
- DEC and GBHS structures and systems
- Policy and the Application of Professional Judgment
- Establishing your Classroom Management System

- Building Positive Relationships

- Report Writing and Guidelines
- Developing a Unit of Work
- Developing, Culling, Annotating and Evaluating Evidence

Mr Heiler HSIE, Mr Chebib Learning Support/PDHPE, Ms Richardson TAS and Mr Khoury Science, are in their final stages of completing their evidence for submission by the end of Term 4. They have all put in an amazing amount of effort and dedication to this process. Ms Bendeich English and Ms Havea TAS will be completing this process in 2013.

NSTs Maintaining Accreditation:

I have also been supporting and resourcing NSTs that are in the process of maintaining their Accreditation. Congratulations to Ms Andraos in Science who is the first NST in our school to complete her first phase of Maintenance.

Other Projects:

As I am employed across two schools, the other being Auburn Girls High, I have developed a cross-site project whereby teachers from both schools can visit the other. Ms Richardson spent a day in the Music Faculty at AGHS and Ms Fletcher (from AGHS) spent a day with our HSIE faculty here at the school. Both teachers found it very beneficial as they were able to engage in professional dialogue with colleagues, observe lessons being taught and exchange resources.

The National Standards:

In terms of Accreditation of NSTs the NSW Standards are being replaced with the National Standards. Teachers will now be 'Certified' (Accredited) in the following domains:

Future of the Head Teacher Mentor Position:

The Head Teacher Mentor positions have been secured in NSW schools until the end of 2013.

Plans for 2013:

I have a few priority areas in 2013 that I will be working on including professional learning for teachers around the National Standards, developing a professional learning community of NSTs across GBHS and AGHS using PLANE & IRIS and developing an online resource for the school for NSTs and HTs of NSTs to access to support them in achieving mandatory Accreditation.

Those students looking at TAFE, apprenticeships/traineeships or work should be now accessing the TAFE NSW website to see when information days are on for the course they are interested in. All applications are now online.

<u>Year 11</u>

But the principal, Linda O'Brien, knew she was on to something with her plan for a new band at Granville Boys High School when she saw the shocked and excited faces of boys being given instruments to take home.

"This is a school where most things are under lock and key," Ms O'Brien said. "But now the only damage is replacement of reeds [in the saxophone mouthpieces] and they talk about 'doing a gig'."

And the next time they'll be "doing a gig"? Tuesday night, for a return to the Opera House. Which you'd have to say isn't a bad spot to play for 12-, 13- and 14year-olds who two years ago couldn't play a note.

Advertisement the western Sydney school, with a diverse demographic make-up, is no stranger to the potential for alienated teenagers drifting away from school and families

With music teachers such as Noel Dixon, who had already built up a band at Ashfield Boys High School, at the beginning of last year, Ms O'Brien worked on a plan to develop a music and dance program at the school that would build not just some skills but a community spirit.

"It's collaborative, it's about enjoying yourself together but it's also about hard work," said Ms O'Brien of the program that extends from the "show band" of years 7 and 8 to an Arabic band, dance groups, an older school band and an Islander dance troupe.

All up, more than 100 boys in a school of 480 participate in the entirely voluntary program, though the junior band is clearly the star attraction today. Not least because, preparing to play a ska version of Georgy Girl on Tuesday as part of the multi-school Our Spectacular concert, they've donned ties, jackets and pork-pie hats in classic rude boy fashion, the trombones and trumpets swinging in co-ordinated moves. "They are all pretty keen," said Mr Dixon looking at the band line-up, which also features saxophones, bass and drums, guitars and ukulele, percussion, keyboards, strings and two vocalists.

"Just to get this started was a real hurdle but once they got going they really bloomed."

Not surprising really, says dapper keyboardist David Gatluak, as they get to play old and new songs they know from the radio.

"And playing for big crowds is amazing," he said.

And as for anything to complain about, such as giving up your free time to practise or not being part of the lunchtime indoor soccer competition, you won't hear any whining here, explained guitarist E.J. Taufa.

"We are so committed to playing," he enthused, "that we forget about any problems."

Dooleys awards \$737,200 in grants to community groups

A PRESENTATION ceremony was held last month at Dooleys Lidcombe Catholic Club to hand out \$727,200 in funding to non-profit community organisations through the 2012 ClubGrants Scheme.

Formerly known as the Community Development and Support Expenditure Scheme (CDSE), the smallest grant was \$1,000 and the largest was \$53,600.

Under the scheme, clubs that earn more than \$1 million in gaming machine revenue, provide funding for community projects and services, and in turn, receive dollar-for-dollar gaming tax deductions.

Memory Chests created by students from Auburn West Public School (AWPS) and the GBHS, were displayed for parents and guests, who also viewed the launch of a film about the project called *Being a Granville Boy*.

AWPS assistant principal ESL Suzanne Galvin said the projects were the result of a "unique collaboration" between a class of Year 10 students from Granville Boys led by teacher Jimmy Bellavia and a class of Year 6 students led by teacher Melissa Seymour.

Mr Bellavia said the students held three workshops at both schools during terms two and three.

"My Year 10 History Elective boys were chosen to act as mentors for the younger students," he explained.

"This gave them a sense of ownership and the boys thrived and took on the role of an 'older brother'. A film was developed to showcase the student's achievements.

"The vision for our project was to establish, build and maintain positive relationships within the community. They had to think outside the box and were asked to be innovative and unique."

Ms Galvin said the Memory Chest project called on the students to select personal items that were significant to their lives.

"It is about who they are and how they see themselves in the world today," she said.
