The students in this year's enrichment class have been issued with iPads. These iPads are linked to our system and students are able to work collaboratively on various projects. The staff and students have had a wonderful term as scientists, historians and film makers.

# **DEPUTY PRINCIPAL REPORT**

In term one, the school cross-faculty Literacy and Numeracy data teams continued to analyse school data and consider whole school planning for teaching and learning. The teaching and learning strategies will be aligned to school priorities in Literacy and Numeracy, and Engagement. The data teams have been briefed to consider how reading and writing, and language conventions can be effectively integrated into faculty assessment and learning. Spelling activities have been developed for stage 5 and will be refined and implemented across the junior school in the form of word activities and spelling competitions. This will be coordinated in the coming terms through the Literacy Team. The Participation team continued to develop the term two Integrated Learning task for the 8C class. In week 11, task developers from the Participation team and the selected teachers of 8C worked together to finalise the teaching program and learning material.

The two year 8 classes' trialing the first integrated learning unit completed a learning questionnaire and were interviewed as part of the school 'student voice' initiatives. Initial feedback indicated that integrated learning was a more effective method of engaging students and developing a deeper understanding of the relationship between different subjects and the real world. We are expecting that the survey data will be analysed over the coming weeks and a report will be presented early in term two. This process will form an integral part of the evaluation of integrated learning in stage 4 and for future development of whole school learning and professional development.

As part of the continual improvement and innovation cycle intrinsic to The Platform for Collaborative Education, one teacher from each faculty attended a corporate marking training coordinated by Mr Hardcastle (HT English) and Ms Gandouin (Literacy Team Leader). The training prepared staff for a whole school corporate marking activity in persuasive writing and student sample marking. The whole staff corporate marking was held the following week and was organised in faculty groups, with trained members of staff and the English faculty assisting throughout the process. This is the second opportunity staff has participated in this form of professional learning. During term two, faculties will be using the knowledge from the corporate marking to review current Stage 4 assessment practices and will develop new assessment activities that is aligned to the assessment and learning advice from the data teams.

A reminder that students in Years 7 and 9 will be

completing the National Assessment Program for Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) test in 2012. There are four tests covering numeracy, reading, writing and language conventions (spelling, punctuation and grammar).

The test schedule is:

Tuesday 15th May 2012 – Language Conventions and Writing

Wednesday 16th May 2012 - Reading

Thursday 17th May 2012 – Numeracy

Throughout the term Year 7 and 9 students completed a number of booklets that targeted specific areas of learning to develop basic skills and understanding in literacy and numeracy. Students also completed a practice NAPLAN test to familiarise themselves with test procedures, provide a snapshot for their achievement and give teachers an opportunity to evaluate current faculty programs. Early in term two, Students will be rehearsing the routines of the NAPLAN test during the second practice test and they will be participating in writing workshops to reinforce persuasive writing techniques. The results from this second practice test will be included in student achievement in the semester one report. In week 11, Year 9 parents were invited to the school to discuss student performance throughout the term. Parents were presented with revision material and sample tests for students to complete over the Easter holidays. Parents are encouraged to support this process, as students will benefit greatly by completing all the revision booklets and the sample tests.

We would like to thank all Year 7 to 10 parents who participated in the 2012 Priority Schools Program Survey. We are hoping that the information provided in the survey will translate into additional resources for the school. Parents are reminded that the survey is confidential and information on occupations and educational qualifications is collected only to determine the level of funding. The anticipated release of the Priority Schools list for the period 2013 to 2016 will occur around July 2012.



# **HEAD TEACHER WELFARE**

This is a very exciting time for our students at GBHS. They have the chance to participate in student leadership programs as well as programs run by outside organisations.

Here are some of the programs that began this term.

On Tuesday the 13<sup>th</sup> of March we had the *Aspirations* launch.

The development of the Year 11 Aspirations program was in direct response to principals, who had experienced the benefits and positive impact of facilitated mentoring on students in programs such as GOALS. The principals identified that for some schools there was a need for a program focusing on career paths for older students as Year 11 is a critical time for students in determining their pathways beyond high school. At this stage of senior school, students are planning what type of further education they will pursue, potential apprenticeships and whether they will continue with all of their subjects or with school at all. Students living in areas of high need often lack access to a range of social networks, work opportunities and positive role models and their choices beyond school are influenced by factors such as:

- lack of understanding about their own strengths and skills and how to further develop them due to low self-esteem and confidence
- lack of knowledge about different pathways
- no sense of entitlement to further education or career pathways outside the local community.

The Aspirations program runs for approximately two terms.

The students went to PricewaterhouseCoopers (PWC) for their first session on Tuesday the 27<sup>th</sup> March. They were very impressive. They were happy to participate in all the activities. They were motivated and enthusiastic. The mentors and facilitators were very impressed with the students behaviour and confidence.

We also started Links to Learning. This program is designed for Year 10 students. It is a targeted program implemented by the NSW Department of Education and Communities to improve outcomes for young people and focuses on effective transitions for at risk young people. This program runs every Tuesday at school.

Links to Learning projects help young people to remain in school, or access post school education or training courses by :

- improving skills in reading, writing and maths
- developing communication and technology skills
- increasing confidence, self esteem and resilience
- setting education, training and career goals
- developing work skills

This program is run by facilitators from The Arab Council Australia.

We have also started Social Skills Intervention Program this Term. This program is run with students from Years 7 to 9. It is aimed at improving students social skills.

We are using The Help Increase the Peace (HIP) program which was developed by the American Friends Service Committee staff in Syracuse, New York, in 1991 as a youth-oriented program to address the epidemic of violence in schools. HIP is based on the conviction that nonviolence and participation in our communities can better each of us and our world.

Workshops focus on three themes: options to violence; dealing with racism, prejudices, and our differences; and the belief that we can each participate in our communities to bring about positive social change.



HIP training is composed of three levels of workshops, each 1 period long once a week, with increases in skills.

The building blocks of the workshops are affirmation, communication, cooperation, conflict resolution, and prejudice reduction. HIP uses cooperative games, discussions, role-playing, and lively group activities to build skills.

Another program which began two weeks ago is ACTIV 8. This program is run by the Association of Bhanin El Minieh

ACTIV8 aims to promote engagement in learning and employment through fortnightly mentoring sessions running from March to October 2012. The program aims to encourage awareness of lifelong learning and career opportunities, as well as an awareness of the benefits of community engagement. Students are involved in football, ice skating, drumming, celebrity appearances to name a few.

It is designed for Years 8 and 9 students. It is on every Thursday fortnight from 2:00 pm until 4:00 pm. The boys got the chance to meet Hazem El-Masri during the first session. They were very excited to listen to and play football with him. It has been a very successful program so far and hopefully the students will continue to learn from it and enjoy it at the same time.

Next Term The GOALS program will commence. This is for Year 9 students.

We are making every effort to ensure that boys are involved in a program that suits their needs.

Please ensure that students arrive to school on time everyday and are in full school uniform.

I hope that the students have a very good and restful holiday and I am looking forward to working with you and your children next term.



#### **Rio Tinto Science Competition**

Students from years 7 to 12 has been offered the opportunity to represent Granville Boys High School in the Big Rio Tinto Science Competition next term on Wednesday the 23<sup>rd</sup> of May 2012. The Science competition aims to stimulate interest in Science and allows students to develop skills essential for scientific practice. The science faculty urges students to become involved as the experience gained in these competitions will assist them in their learning and their performance in school based tests. The entry fee of \$7.00 is required to the front office before the end of this term. WATCH this space for more details!!

#### Year 7:

Year 7 students are enjoying a series of experiments planned under the topic "Being Scientific". The skills that students have developed in doing these experiments are helping them to develop their capacity in planning and carrying out first hand investigations, making observations and reading scales. In addition, Year 7 are also learning about safety and types of equipment used in the Science laboratory.

#### Year 8:

This term, the students of 8B and the Enrichment class were actively engaged in an Integrated Learning project called "Myth Busters". The boys began the project with the myth "toast always falls face down". After conducting a number of trials of the experiment they found that this myth was not correct. Students were then given the opportunity to choose their own topic of interest and conduct experiments in small groups. Some of the boys chose to investigate whether diet coke and mentos causes effervescence while others experimented to see whether an egg shell disappears when placed in vinegar and etc...



#### Year 9

The students are learning about electricity, light and the effects of global warming. Their assessment task included a research component and an oral presentation on global warming through various mediums such as a poster, a rap song, creative writing story etc...

#### **Year 10:**

This term, Year 10 students are working on their Student Research Projects and are also extending their knowledge of the periodic table and learning to write formulae, balance equations and conduct experiments on chemical reactions.

#### **Year 11:**

On Wednesday 7 March, Year 11 Biology and Year 11 Senior Science students went to Bicentennial Park in Sydney Olympic Park to investigate a local ecosystem. It was a Field Study Assessment Task that meets the Board of Studies course requirements. The students eagerly participated in numerous activities that were set up and co-ordinated by the service team at Sydney Olympic Park. They worked in groups and studied the adaptations of mangroves to its habitat and the distribution and abundance of plant and animal species in a salt marsh. It was a great success and the students thoroughly enjoyed applying the skills they had learnt in class, to a practical situation.



#### Year 12

The Biology and Senior Science students attended a workshop at the UNSW Museum of Diseases on Tuesday 28 February. The boys had a wonderful time to see diseased preserved body parts and prosthetics.

# HSIE REPORT

Once again the HSIE faculty has had a busy but productive time since the printing of the last Bulletin. The faculty has worked together to jointly input into its yearly plan. Members of the faculty have also spent time reviewing programs to introduce a greater variety of ICT tasks, including the use of the electronic white board into their classrooms.

Teachers are working collaboratively during faculty meetings to address issues raised as a result of last year's Year 9 NAPLAN results. We are hoping to introduce strategies to improve student outcomes. Another feature of this term has been the involvement of our students in competitions and the completion of assessment tasks by some students to a very high standard.

Over the last month a number of excursions have taken place. The Year 7 students participated in a very successful excursion on Sydney Harbour and achieved a number of outcomes including the investigation of Australia's physical environments and looking at the issues in Australian environments. Student got to see how Sydneysiders exploit the natural environment to conduct trade and business and also how the trade and business along Sydney's coastline has changed over the centuries especially due to the impact of technology. As a trained Historian I found the journey from Circular Quay to Balmain and out past Garden Island illuminating. The stay at Shark Island was also greeted enthusiastically by students – especially our keen fishermen. All in all it was a great day. Special thanks to Ms Kiran and Mr Heiler for the organisation and their participation in the day - special thanks to Ms Cullen-Ward.



Students in Year 8 also attended an excursion this term on the topic of Indigenous Australians. Part of the course relies on students recalling what traditional aboriginal life was like. Students on the excursion got to meet a number of people who work in the sustainability area of Auburn Council. Students investigated Duck River by comparing through observation and comparison how the river's health has changed over time, particularly with the arrival of Europeans. Students got to discuss with resident artists the features of aboriginal painting and in one group I participated in an interesting conversation evolved from the simple question of "how did the artist achieve that effect"? Students and artists then went on to discuss subject the matter in the artist's art. By far the most captivating was the exhibition on the tools and methods used by Aborigines to catch and collect food and how they prepared it for eating. Congratulations to the boys for their excellent behavior on the day and thank you to Ms Ghosh for organizing the excursion.



Have you ever wondered how do companies know what price to set for a product? The Year 9 Commerce boys have been working on this with Mr Heiler and as part of their course have gone to the school's kitchens and created cakes that they then went out into the school and sold. I am told the money raised will go towards subsidizing an excursion. The students have gained valuable information in how to create a budget and how to source supplies cheaply in order to make a good quality product at a profit. Mr Heiler reports that the boys were very enthusiastic and the experience

has created a very positive buzz in the class. In week 9 Mr Heiler took students from the year 10 Geography classes to a regional geography competition. Our students came second from a total of 10 teams – congratulations to those boys.

Now what would you do if, as a fisheries inspector you came across someone catching a protected species? Should they have the right to say I'm innocent because I didn't know? Over the last two weeks 7 boys in Year 10 have been working solidly to prove that ignorance isn't always a legal defense. The boys from the Mock trial team will compete against St Patricks on Thursday at 4:30pm. Close family members are always welcome to come along and support the school team.

In the first week of term 2 the school will be commemorating ANZAC day. This day has grown over the decades and has gone from being a small event when "I was a school boy" often regarded as something that will eventually die out into a day that is looked on as a chance for all people of all nationalities to honour the bravery and sacrifice of the many men and women who have died as soldiers in battle. Our school has the unique opportunity of celebrating the bravery and valour of both Australian and Turkish soldiers on the battlefields of Gallipoli Africa, Asia and Europe as well as the sacrifices of many other nationalities. Mr Bellavia is coordinating the day's activities with the support of faculty members.

Over the last 10 weeks students in Year 11 History have studied the background causes of the Arab Israeli conflict. One of the highlights of any learning is the incidental things you pick up as you read, discuss and come to a conclusion. For me the fact that no pogroms were only a European occurrence and not a feature of Arab or Palestinian life was something that gives me hope that the conflict does have a peaceful solution. We were lucky that people from the Jewish and Palestinian communities were willing to give their time and come and explain the position of their nation to our students.

Lastly I wanted to explore some of the careers that are available to students who choose the HSIE subjects. In this issue I'm going to start off with Geography in Years 11 and 12. While there aren't many job titles that are "geographer," there are many types of positions that fit well with a degree in geography. A recent internet search yielded an interesting array of vocations some of which are listed below: urban planning which Geography is a natural tie-in with urban or city planning. City planners work on zoning, land use, and new developments, from a petrol station renovation to

the development of whole new sections of urban area. City governments, council agencies, and other government agencies and private groups are often in need of experienced GIS professionals. Coursework and internships in GIS are especially important. Computer programming or engineering skills are very helpful in this arena - the more about computers and languages you know, the better off you are.

In **Transportation management** like urban and city planning, there are opportunities in local government but regional transit authorities or shipping, logistics, and transportation companies look kindly to someone with transportation geography in their background and good computer and analytical skills.

**Environmental Management** A plethora of environmental assessment, cleanup, and management companies exist throughout the world today. A geographer brings excellent skills for project management and the development of reports like environmental impact reports. It's often a wide-open field with tremendous growth opportunities. The above information appeared in a site called about.com

# **MATHEMATICS REPORT**

Mathematics Faculty Article (Term 1, Bulletin 2)
We approach the end of Term 1 with relief and excitement at the prospect of the upcoming vacation. This term all students have been busy with setting the routine in their Mathematics classes. The year 7's have settled in very well as well and can navigate themselves around the school without getting lost. It is very encouraging to see the senior students displaying a greater sense of purpose and determination in their study of Mathematics.

#### **Studying Mathematics (Helpful Hints)**

- 1. Avoid the risk of frustration. The later stuff builds on the earlier stuff. A math book is like a novel, it doesn't make sense unless you start at the beginning.
- 2. **Know your basics**. Practise regularly to develop your Mathematical brain. Regular practice will ease your challenges.
- Try to work out the problems and do the exercises. If there is a sample problem in your book, or an example problem, work through it yourself, and use the sample in your book to guide you.
- 4. Solve the easier problems first, so you can mentally warm up your brain for the more complicated ones
- 5. Learn the vocabulary! Every area of Math has its own vocabulary. You must understand the language of Mathematics. The commonly used words in English may not mean the same in Mathematics.

- Identify the error. If you make a mistake in a problem, or in a proof, or take a wrong turn, figure out why! Figure out what it was, or what it was that you were thinking, that led you down the wrong path
- 7. **Be able to explain it to somebody else**. This is a sure way to find out what you don't understand. You learn more when you teach it to someone else.

#### NAPLAN

Years 7 and 9 will sit for the National assessment (NAPLAN) from 15 to 17th of May this year. To help students prepare well for this assessment, the year 9 students are issued with NAPLAN preparation booklets every week. Students are required to complete the booklet during the week. Teachers have allocated specific times to go over the booklets with students so as to clarify doubts and offer help. Parents are encouraged to help their children complete the books.

#### **MATHLETICS**

Mathletics is the interactive learning software, for students. At Granville Boys, all students from years 7 to 10 have now been given passwords that allow access to Mathletics and a Literacy feature Spellodrome, both at home and in school. Teachers set focus activities, home work, and tests through Mathletics, which give instant feedback to both the student and the teacher. The lessons set on Mathletics are based on the teaching program planned for the particular classes in 2012. Students accumulate points on Mathletics and are awarded Bronze, Silver and games certificates. Maths live competitions develop mathematical skills in students through interactive activities and are enjoyed by all students. All students must spend some time at home on Mathletics every week. I would like parents to encourage their children to practice Mathematics on Mathletics.




#### **HSC TUTORIALS**
