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
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RELIEVING PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

What a year 2016 has been for Granville Boys High School! The boys at our school have the opportunity to participate in such a wide range of learning and extra curricular activities, such engagement really helps students to feel a special sense of value and belonging to our learning community.

The Trade Skills Centre, our hospitality facility, was officially opened on 16th November by the honourable John Alexander OAM MP, member for Bennelong. This facility was funded by the federal government to serve the Granville Community. Our students have re opened the Pulse Café out of the new state of the art commercial kitchen and it is a regular meeting place for students, staff and the P&C. This outstanding facility means that our students can learn in a commercial grade environment, developing skills transferable to any hospitality workplace. Students studying, Design and Technology, Food Technology and Hospitality will make regular use of the TSC.

Term 4 saw Mr Ghazal and Mr Wynne take a group of students to their Year 7 camp held at the Great Aussie Bush Camp in Tea Gardens. The boys challenged themselves with activities including the giant swing, abseiling and the giant slide. They worked as strong teams to complete a high ropes team challenge and a race through a mud filled obstacle course. Camp is such an important part of Year 7. It allows students and their teachers to bond and get to know each other. Camp also encourages students to really work at developing critical skills regarding independence, self-regulation, selfmanagement and team work. Sometimes development of these skills whilst on camp, is a greater challenge than the organised activities students participate in. Congratulations to all of the boys who attended the camp and a big thank you to Mr Wynne and Mr Ghazal who took the time away from their own families to attend and support our students.

This term Year 7 have been participating in swim school every Tuesday during sport. This year GBHS teachers have been teaching the boys a variety of different skills to ensure their survival and safety in the water. Swimming at the beach and pool is a great activity for the warmer months but can so easily become dangerous. Participation in the Learn to Swim program means that our students know how to enter and exit the water safety, float and complete a variety of survival strokes, support themselves if they get into trouble in the water and provide help and assistance if someone they are with gets into trouble also. A big thank you to the staff facilitating the lessons and heartfelt congratulations to the students who are participating so positively.

The staff and students trialled a new rewards system at GBHS this term. All students were issued with a 'coffee card' and their behaviour in class was monitored by teachers. Students who were on time to class, had the correct equipment, demonstrated a positive attitude to learning and were polite and respectful were rewarded with a stamp on their card. Completed stamp cards were handed into the office and students were rewarded for their efforts. So far this term students have received certificates, iTunes vouchers and an invitation to the Deputy Principal's reward excursion to Wet'n'Wild. Students have worked very hard to collect stamps and achieve different levels of rewards. The PBIS team will continue to develop this system of encouragement to support as many students as possible to be engaged in their learning and behaving positively.

Mr Ghazal took a number of talented AFL players to Melbourne to participate in the national finals for the Bachar Houli Cup. Granville Boys qualified for this prize after winning the Sydney rounds of the tournament. This trip was generously sponsored by the GWS Giants. Unfortunately on the day we were defeated in a nail biter against the Australian International Academy of Melbourne. The boys were also very lucky to experience some of Melbourne's highlights including an 'access all areas' tour of MCG and some sampling of Melbourne's finest restaurants. Mr Ghazal reported that the boys behaviour, participation and sportsmanship was exemplary at all times.

Granville Boys High School has been working towards becoming a White Ribbon School - standing against violence against women. Mr Widdison and Ms Cashman have led the campaign creating an organising committee of passionate teachers and students. Our students have all been participating in morning roll call lessons which highlight features of healthy, respectful relationships and support services available to the community. Our Arabic drummers participated in a march organised by Campsie police through the streets of Lakemba. This White Ribbon march is one of the biggest of its kind and a great honour for the boys to be a part of. Our Arabic band also participated in annual White Ribbon Assembly at Auburn Girls. This year, Granville Boys will also be hosting a White Ribbon Assembly held the week after White Ribbon Day. In our assembly GBHS will showcase learning undertaken during roll call lessons, a video presentation made by the SRC, dance and music performances, a visit from a white ribbon ambassador and a variety of speeches made by members of our local community. Students and staff will be given the opportunity to make the White Ribbon pledge and pledge against violence and remaining silent. Each year we will continue to build on our White Ribbon program to ensure that our entire school community stands strong against violence.

Mrs Adderley and her classes have worked very hard on Betsy the bright blue cow as part of the Archibull program for 2016. The Archibull Prize is a world renowned program with curriculum links to explore the role agriculture plays in the health, wealth and sustainable development of the farming industry. Mrs Adderley and her students focused on cotton. Their hard work and dedication paid off and Granville Boys was picked as a finalist in the infographic category. Well done team!!

School Spectacular, Together for Humanity, Robotics, High Resolves, Peace Day, Creating Chances are just a few other of the extra-curricular activities boys have participated in this term. What a rich education our boys are receiving here at GBHS!

Year 12 students completed their HSC exams earlier this term. We look forward to celebrating their results with them later this year (December 15th). I encourage any parent or student from Year 12, who requires support or advice during this time, to contact the school and speak with their Year Adviser Mr Collins, or Careers Adviser Ms Bailey.

DEPUTY PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

The sounds of the Aussie summer are upon us once again: voices of Australian cricket on radio and television and cicadas singing in the bush herald our long holiday. Year 11 students have morphed into Year 12 and are now the school community leaders. They will undertake their first round of HSC assessment tasks before the end of term. It is important for them to take the time and care necessary to achieve the outcomes of each task as best they can. Homework Club runs on Monday and Wednesday afternoons from 2:55pm to 4:00pm and is staffed by teachers who can assist students with their work. On Tuesday afternoons from 1pm to 2:30pm, senior students who have yet to complete overdue work, meet in the library with Ms Cullenward and other staff so this is also an opportunity for those who need assistance with a task, to attend.

Year 9 students have had a busy term and with the rest of years 7-10, are currently completing their yearly examinations. They have participated in a wide range of extra-curricular activities which offer leadership development through decision-making, learning selfdiscipline, developing individual and team skills, making the most appropriate choice for the situation, making the transition from boy to man and creating resilience and persistence: Together For Humanity has required the students to explore matters of interfaith and social justice; ASPIRE at UNSW involves the participants in university style learning and projects; Through *ICE*, the students have participated in a special creative writing program under the watchful eye of an Australian author and Mr Egan, whilst other students have participated in Links to Learning; and in Sheik Wisam's program the students have enjoyed a lot of different challenges.

Some of the year 11 students will recall participating in a project called *Urban Renewal* when they were in year 7. Since 2012, **Project-based Learning (PBL)** has been implemented at GBHS. Year 7 undertook 4 PBL units of work in that year and since then a number of PBL units of work- Mythbusters, My Identity, Robotics, Game On, Robotics, Horrible Histories, Virtual Museum, STEM project – to name just a few, have been implemented to stage 4 and stage 5 students. What we discovered from these experiences, backed by research, was that our students found PBL to be an effective and engaging way to learn. Through sustained enquiry, the boys developed deeper learning skills required for success in life beyond school, be it further learning at TAFE, university, on the job or for being a citizen in our community. PBL connects students with the community and the wider world, eg The Urban Renewal Project asked students to submit a proposal for the urban renewal of the Clyde area to meet a growing demand for community space due to a population increase in the Parramatta municipality. The boys were advised by a town planner, visited the site and came up with solutions for which they developed a prototype using materials of their own choice (such as mindcraft) and finally they presented their findings to an audience which included a number of 'experts' from Parramatta Council, the town planner and parents. After completing the project, students understood the content of the Key Learning Areas involved, deeply, and were able to discuss their ideas in detail with an external evaluator. This project and the others which have been implemented, demonstrated students who gain content knowledge with PBL are better able to apply what they know and can do to new situations. Within a PBL unit, there are lessons of direct instruction as well as enquiry-based learning.

PBL will continue to be implemented at GBHS in 2017. Year 7 will undertake many PBL units of work and years 8-10 will also find real-life solutions to challenging problems through sustained enquiry. The teachers have been working hard all year to design,

create, implement and review gold standard Project-based Learning for the students at GBHS. Please ask your son about what he is learning at school and particularly about any project he has completed.

Thank you to all the students, staff and parents for their hard work this year. It has been a very busy year at GBHS for the students and staff.

MATHEMATICS REPORT

A busy term 4 is fast approaching the finish line. This is the time when the junior students have their final assessments and teachers write their yearly reports giving an overview of the students' performance for the year. The year 8 students, however, have a placement test to do on the 1st of December. This cumulative assessment will determine their placement into the three pathways in year 9 next year. Students who qualify for Pathway 5.3 and maintain their effort in year 10, would be able to do Mathematics and/or Mathematics Extension 1 in year 11. Students who are chosen for

Pathway 5.2 would be capable of doing Mathematics and/or General Mathematics 1 in year 11. Those students who enter the Pathway 5.1 course would only be able to do General Mathematics 1 in year 11 and either General Mathematics 1 or General Mathematics 2 in year 12.

For students who aspire to go to university for tertiary education, particularly to do Engineering, Medicine and Aviation, to mention a few, need to do Pathway 5.3 in years 9 and 10, to be able to do Mathematics Extension 1 in years 11 and 12 and Extension 2 in year 12. Parents can support and encourage their son's educational endeavours to achieve to his potential. They can help by setting high expectations for success, monitoring homework, assignments and course work, or by just being there to talk to their children about learning.

In term 4 select group of year 10 and 11 students attended the UNSW Mathematics and Engineering workshops on the university campus and participated in a number of workshops. Students found the workshops highly valuable and an insight into the cross curricula link between Mathematics and Science in tertiary education.

This is also a planning time for the next year. In 2016 the teachers in the Maths faculty would spend some time writing new programs for year 7 or refining existing ones for other years. All year 7s will do PBL classes (Project Based Learning) classes in 2017.

In weeks 8 and 9 this term, the year 12's who are now in the first term of their HSC coursework will sit for their first HSC assessment task. It is thus imperative that the students prepare themselves thoroughly for these tasks as it will contribute towards the quality of their HSC grade. Students can access help with their school work and homework by attending the homework centre in the library on Mondays and Wednesdays. If students need specific help with Mathematics, they need arrange a time with their teacher for further help.

Australian Mathematics Competition

In August this year a group of 22 students participated in the Australian Mathematics Competition which is a prestigious National competition in which our boys usually perform quite well. Two students achieved distinction, ten students achieved credits, eight achieved proficiency while two others were awarded participation certificates. Those students who missed out this year would get another opportunity to participate in the AMC in 2017. Registration dates will be advertised early in term 1 next year.

Back to School in 2017

A very important part of the back to school preparation is purchasing stationery and other equipment before the school begins. Parents must take advantage of the reduced prices during The "Back to School" sales and stock up on their son's stationery needs. Mathematics faculty requires every student to have the following

equipment on their first day of school in the 2017 school year.

- A Scientific calculator Model: fx 82 Plus (This can also be purchased at school for \$25)
- Ruler, rubber, pencils,
- Pens (Blue, Red, and Black)
- A Geometry set

- All Books must be covered/contacted

Valid online 2016




Yearly Exams and Assessments

All Yr.9 and Yr.10 students have completed their yearly examinations while Yr.7, 8 & 11students have completed their assessments for this year



ENGLISH Report Ms Bazouni

As we approach the end of yet another school year, I would like to take the opportunity to thank all the parents and guardians for their help and support this year. I would also like to congratulate our 2016 Year 12 students, who have just finished their Higher School Certificate Examinations and, along with their teachers, are patiently waiting for their results.

Year 11 have now commenced their first HSC modules, this being effectively their first term of Year 12. The Advanced class are currently completing <u>Module B: Critical Study of Texts</u>, closely examining Shakespeare's play 'Hamlet'. Year 12 Standard are currently studying the novel 'The Story of Tom Brennan' by JC Burke for <u>Module C-Elective 2: Exploring Transitions</u>. English Studies are working on a module entitled 'The Big Screen – English in Film Making'. All students are encouraged to keep up their hard work and to revise all their texts over the six week break.

This term Year 10 have explored the concepts of bias and racism and how they appeared within the film 'The Hurricane', the Rubin Carter story, and the website entitled 'Graphic Witness'. Students were assessed on their ability to identify the concept of bias and how it manipulated audience opinion towards the issues presented within the texts. They are currently delving into the world of 'Teenagers' through a novel study that explores the challenges teenagers face whilst growing up. We wish them the best of luck as they are soon to begin their journey as senior students of the school.

Students in Year 9 undertook a study of either a survival-themed creative writing unit or a comparison of the 'Lion King' and 'Hamlet'. Throughout the 'Survival Unit' students responded to texts by creating blogs or original narratives based on their study of 'Lord of the Flies' and '300 Minutes'. The comparative unit required students to analyse the differences between Shakespeare's 'Hamlet' and Disney's 'The Lion King' and discuss how the changes in genre to suit a new audience and context. Students are currently completing a unit which examines the effects of contexts on texts by exploring the film 'Resident Evil; Apocalypse.'

With creativity flowing, our Year 8 students have shown particular promise in their study of Creative Writing. They also undertook a range of cross-curricular PBL projects including 'From the Perspective of a Child', 'An Ottoman's Fable' and 'Kicking Goals'. These units were highly successful, allowing students to draw links between subjects and to engage in hands on learning in non-traditional classroom settings. Year 8 are currently completing a unit on 'Poetry' studying a range of poems including the works of Oodgeroo Noonuccal, a famous Indigenous poet. This unit has been received with great enthusiasm, and will benefit the students greatly as it helps them become more confident identifying and analysing poetic techniques.

Students in year 7 have engaged in a variety of Shakespearean texts, reading and performing scenes from some of Shakespeare's most famous plays, including 'Twelfth Night' and 'Macbeth'. In doing so students have developed an understanding of thematic concerns within Shakespeare and how these are applied in modern texts and can be accessible to modern audiences. Along with this, students have engaged in Indigenous origin stories and how these stories represent a belonging to place and country.

Last, but not least, congratulations to Mr Egan and our Year 10 WestWords participants. An article published in the Sydney Morning Herald highlighted how hard work does pay off. A group of our Year 10 students, led by Mr Egan, went on a week-long camp in Baradine, NSW. During this time they critiqued other students' works and had their work critiqued. I can't wait to see the final copy of their anthology which should be published very soon.

On behalf of the English faculty, I would like to wish everybody a pleasant, safe and relaxing Summer holiday. I look forward to seeing everybody back for another excellent year of English in 2017.

The students that were selected from Granville Boys' High School have always been intellectually capable. They read widely, speak adeptly and have stories to tell. What they didn't have was the ability to effectively express themselves in their creative writing.

The journey with WestWords started with Mark Treddinick, a well-known poet, who introduced the boys to some of the classics, in particular the romantic period. Through him they learned the importance of selecting individual words and how these can shape not just a story, but the ideas and responses to it.

The boys' passion for writing was slowly ignited by James Roy. His irreverence and willingness to joke meant that they hit it off immediately. While students were successful at a number of exercises, particularly those that engage with symbolism, they could not bring it out in their own work at

The year-long process allowed for students to give, receive and accept criticism in an anonymous manner. By critiquing others, students learnt how to accept advice and this paid enormous dividends. The camp became about the writing (in between marathon games of spotlight and the small mountain of sugar consumed) and three days of immersing themselves produced snatches of strong and entertaining writing.

The students began to work in their own time using those pieces as starting points. Drafts were re-submitted (and slashed) and they continued to toil away at their writing, meeting up in the school holidays to conduct readings and critique each other's work. They fed off the improvements they saw, not just in their own writing but in those around them, each time striving for more.

This year we had six students receive Gold awards and four receive platinum rewards. I am very proud of the students who are engaging in this literacy activity and their improvement is being reflected in their classroom work.

I would like to take this opportunity to emphasise the importance or wide reading (which is the reading of a variety of texts) often for recreational purposes. With the summer holidays fast approaching it is important to encourage boys to continue to read over the holiday, some recommended strategies are:

- Have books available at home
- Let your children see you reading for pleasure
- Borrow books from your local library
- Show enthusiasm for your children's reading ask them
 - *what they are reading,
 - *what they like,
 - *recommend to them books you have read read the same book so you can discuss it
- Fathers reading for pleasure encourages boys to read

Reading is directly related to comprehension - the more you read the more your comprehension will improve, thus helping you to understand what you are reading.

Boys often tend to like stories with:

- · Books with a male protagonist (main character)
- · Action books
- · Fantasy books
- · Graphic novels

Year 12

• White Card Courses

We have had a large number of students from year 9 through to year 12 attain their White Card. This is assisting students in their educational pathways and part-time work.

• VET Students and White Card Students

Unique Student Identifier numbers have been created for these students. Please don't lose those numbers as you will need them for applying to other courses in the future.

• Resumes and Job applications online

Students have been creating, updating and completing their Resumes. They have then applied online or visited workplaces for part-time work. As a result several students have gained part-time work either in the retail industry or hospitality industry.
