The TAS staff will be assisting students to complete their major works in Industrial Tech Timber and Design and Technology classes. And holiday lessons have been scheduled for English Standard, English Advanced, Mathematics Standard and Extension and Ancient History. Thank you to Mr Benic, Mr Bakour, Mr Lamin, Mr Hii, Ms Gassibe, Ms Ghamrawi and Mr Pakkiam for teaching these lessons in their own holidays. DEPUTY PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

NAPLAN

In Term 2 Year 7 and 9 students sat their NAPLAN tests and completed Online tests in Reading, Writing, Language Conventions and Numeracy. Students were given many opportunities prior to the exams to be supported with preparation - regular homework booklets, homework club, in class workshops and practice papers. Most students engaged well with these opportunities and benefitted from the support that was available to them. Students also sat for an Online Trial exam to familiarise themselves with the procedures and expectations of the exam. Students should be commended for the effort and consideration they put into their exams. Many thanks to the Learning Services faculty who coordinate these tests ensuring that every student completes all components of the practice and actual NAPLAN test.

Trial HSC Examination

Trial HSC examination will be in weeks 2 and 3 of term 3. This will be from 29th July to 9th August. Students have been given exam timetables, however, if any student who has missed out they can collect a copy from their year Adviser, Ms Ghosh.

Elevate Workshops

Year 10,11 and 12 students have been participating in targeted study skills workshops run by Elevate Education this term. These are designed to help students with Time Management, Note Taking, Stress management and Coping skills. A few concluding workshops will happen next term, helping students prepare for Trial and HSC examinations.

Parent Teacher Night

Parent Teacher night for years 7 - 11 will be on Monday 29th of July from 3.30pm to 5.30pm. This will be the 2nd week of term 3. This is an opportunity to discuss the student's progress with his teachers.

New Timetables

All year 9 students will have a new timetable next term. By the end of Semester 1, students must have done the core subjects English, HSIE, Maths and Science. The compulsory PDHPE component called Food for Thought must be done either in Semester 1 or 2. The following changes will occur

- Students will complete Food for Thought (PDHPE) in Semester 2 if they did not attempt it in Semester 1.
- They will do a maximum of 2 new electives (Only one elective for students doing Food for Thought in Semester 2)
- The core subjects English, HSIE, Maths and Science will run on the same rotation as in Semester 1.

Students will do either English or HSIE in term 3 and do the remaining subject in term 4. Similarly, they will do either Maths or Science in term 3 and do the remaining subject in term 4.

The school is training staff for a new timetabling software that will used next year.

Year 10 Subject Selection

All year 10 students intending to continue at Granville Boys in 2019 have been going through the subject selection process. Students were given their course information booklet on the 17th of June at a Subject Information Evening. They were required to read the booklet and make informed decisions about their choices. A mini careers expo was held on the 20th of June, organised by Ms Bailey. This session, which was very successful, was to give students an opportunity to talk to various representatives from Universities, TAFE, Colleges and other agencies as well as clarifying any myths about their dream jobs and careers. The final step of the process is a face to face interview with the Year Adviser, Careers Adviser and the Deputy Principal. These interviews have been progressing very well in weeks 9 and 10 of this term. If any student has missed out on collecting his subject selection booklet, they need to see Ms Ram or Ms Bailey urgently and make an appointment for a parent meeting. Students will have an opportunity to participate in 'Taster Lessons' on their subject choices in term 4 this year. Any change of subjects will also be permitted during this time.



Minimum Standards

All Students completing the HSC in 2021 or later must meet the HSC minimum standard to receive the HSC. To show that students meet the standard they need to:

- pass the online reading test and
- pass the online writing test and
- pass the online numeracy test.

Students can complete the Minimum HSC Standards in year 10, 11 or 12. They will get 2 opportunities each year to attempt the test. They have 5 years to meet the Minimum HSC Standards after starting the HSC course. **The video explains Minimum HSC Standards**

WELFARE REPORT Mr Pakkiam

In term 2 students from Granville Boys High School had many opportunities to participate in welfare initiatives and leadership programs.

Our new year 7 students had a successful first semester and have worked hard on their projects. A special performance of the play 'Horrible Histories' was attended by Year 6 students from some of the local schools. 75 Year 7 students attended the Deputy Principal reward excursion to Parramatta Events cinema.

This term has been very busy for the year 8's, as they have participated in the Resilience program and continued to practice their mediation skills to assist other GBHS students to resolve their conflict using the peer mediation process. 20 of the year 8 students have been participating in the Korean Cultural Exchange program, exchanging information about our school and our culture with students from a high school in Korea. Using video-conferencing facilities, a different student presents information in each of the 10 sessions. This program promotes cultural understanding and 18 of the year 8 students have appreciation. been participating in the Archibull competition and using their creativity to communicate new information they have learnt about agriculture and, specifically more, the poultry and egg industry. It is then displayed at the Sydney Royal Easter Show for the whole of Australia to see. This extracurricular program at our school promotes harmony, positive relationships, creativity, teamwork, and fun amongst the students.

Selected year 8 students have been developing their swimming skills in preparation for the Waves of Wellness surfing and wellbeing program organised by our school counsellors Mr. Hannouf and

Ms. Cashman for next term. A fundraiser for this program was held at the Revesby Woolworths on the 12th of June.



Current year 11 students and their Year Advisor Mr. Chebib have been busy designing and organising their year 12 Jackets. This has now been finalised and payments are now being collected by the front office. The cost of a jacket is \$99

On the 13th of May students from Emanuel College and our year 8 students had a rich day of learning, listening, sharing and connecting through the Together for Humanity Inter school program at GBHS. The aim of this program is to develop Intercultural and interfaith understanding among students. TFH is a multi-faith organisation that is helping schools, organisations and communities to respond effectively to differences of culture and belief.



On May 9th selected year 9 students and Ms Andraos participated in the "Career Scene Investigation" workshop at UNSW. Students worked in small faculty groups (Engineering, Health, Business, Media, Science and Law) to identify and provide solutions based on a crime scene. This was a fun, hands on event and students worked in mixed groups with ASPIRE staff and Ambassadors.

Congratulations to all the students who attended the event particularly to Shaiokh and Zimraan who came 1st and 3rd respectively in the essay competition "One pen can change the world".



The Year 10 boys had an exceptional time at the Aspire Advantage program with the focus on to introduce a variety of pathways for entry to University, post school study options and the range of university faculties and courses available to students.

Ben and Zimraan won the grand prize out of 20 other teams for their presentation on the topic of "Inequality". The boys loved the experience and developed higher educational aspirations. Thank you very much to Mr. El Homsi and Mr. Hii for accompanying the boys to UNSW.

Youth Frontiers Mentoring Program is an initiative of the NSW Government that has delivered quality mentoring to young people across NSW. The people that participated in this program are then matched with local volunteer mentors with whom they work collaboratively on a community project of their own choosing. 10 students from years 7 and 8 are currently participating in this program from our school.

MATHEMATICS REPORT Ms Khan

This term has been a busy term for both teachers and students. Teachers have been working tirelessly to complete projects, assessments and the semester 1 reports for students. Much thought and insight has gone into formulating comments for individual students. Hence, parents and students are requested to read through them and take suggestions for improvement.

Most students have worked very hard this term to improve their performance in Maths. It is very encouraging to see keen young Mathematicians sacrificing their recess and lunch breaks to get extra help from their teachers. A large group of year 12 students have also utilised the after school tutoring available to prepare themselves for assessments or to brush up on their skills. Their enthusiasm and effort to seek help and clarification on mathematical problems is applauded.

Year 9 students have completed their Maths Design project and the Algebra 1 project for this term. Students enjoyed these projects and some students were highly engaged in their learning during these projects.



HSC Trial Exams

HSC trial exams will be held in weeks 2 and 3 next term. Year 12 students should use their time in the school holidays wisely and should prepare for their trial exams. Students should make a study timetable to help them revise for their exams. Students should make summary notes and practise questions from past exam papers. Students should also time themselves when using past exam questions to check if they are working fast enough to complete the exam. There are plenty of resources (past exam papers with solutions) available on the NESA site for students to access and many other resources such as trial exams from other schools can also be found when searching through the internet. Standard Mathematics, Mathematics and Extension 1 students should carefully look through the reference sheet provided in the exams and learn to use it to maximise their marks in the upcoming trial exam.

SUPPORT REPORT Ms Rudek

The Support Unit have had an amazing term. I was able to meet with all our parents and we worked on establishing goals for individual students.

Mr Nott has worked with two of our classes and this is what he had to say regarding his projects: The brand without a bottle competition - SUPPA and Medici having been working hard on their driving question 'how can we persuade others to drink tap water?' We started the term with a taste test and students discussed the differences between tap and bottled water. Many students (and teachers) were surprised to find that bottled water really doesn't taste any better than tap water, although it costs thousands of times as much! They then looked at advertising and how advertisers use particular techniques to persuade others into buying their products. Researched the reasons why we should be drinking tap water and why drinking bottled water is harmful for the environment. We used all of our research into tap water and our knowledge about persuading others in advertising to start planning our own advertisements. In small groups, we created storyboards persuading others to drink tap water instead of bottled water. Each group member had different roles

- including directors, cameramen, writers, actors, editors and much more. Students worked really hard all term and really loved when we started practicing with the green screen. Groups were given the chance to film their advertisements in front of the green screen and had a really great time doing it. The boys have worked so hard this term and we may even have a few new Spielbergs or Kubricks in the making.

My class have eagerly participated in the Get Ready program which runs once a fortnight. In class we have been reading the novel The Time Machine and we linked this novel to our other KLA subjects.

Last week, the entire Support Unit went to Granville Park for our picnic day and it was a great success. We will continue to do these picnic days each term so that our students further develop their social skills.

LEARNING SERVICES REPORT Ms Adderley

Like all other faculties this term has been extremely busy for the Learning Services Faculty. At the beginning of the term there was a focus on supporting the students with NAPLAN. We have post tested the students that participated in term one reading groups many of the students have shown improvement. We are now preparing for year 7 and 8 individual education plan meetings with parents and students.

The Premiers reading Challenge is well underway, students need to read 20 books to complete the premiers reading challenge, students can borrow from the library If you would like to volunteer to read with students please feel free to contact Ms Love, in the library.

Each year all schools need to complete the Nationally Consistent Collection of Data. The Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (the national data collection) is a joint initiative of all Australian governments and all state and territory government and non-government education authorities. National data is collected annually to identify the number of school students with disability and the level of reasonable educational adjustment provided for them. The national data collection has been progressively implemented since 2015, all government and non-government schools have participated annually in the national data collection. Please take the time to read the parent letter published in this bulletin.

CAREERS REPORT

Fast Forward – Western Sydney University Program

Selected Year 9 and 10 students have attended their Fast Forward session at the Western Sydney University campus at Parramatta. These sessions introduced students to university life, what interests they may have and how they are related to university study and meeting other students from other schools involved with the program.

Year 12

During term 3 year 12 students will be finalising their UAC applications to university, applications for disadvantages and school recommendation scheme. It is suggested that students have already started collecting any documentation they need for supporting their claims. Those students who are looking at Private Colleges, TAFE courses and Apprenticeships will be doing so in early October.

White Card – Star Training Granville

Students who are 14 years old and are thinking of joining a trade once they leave school are able to gain their White Card at Star Training Granville. Students from year 9 through to year 12 have gained their White Card this Term. Granville Boys has a community connection with Star Training which allows students to participate in the program at a cost of \$90.00. If a student is interested they must see the Career Adviser. Students must bring with them their Medicare Card to create their Unique Students Identifier number, collect a letter to get signed from the principal and make a booking for a Monday. The Career Adviser meets and assists students with their administration process.

Year 10 students looking at trying a trade during work experience in Term 4 must have a white card. **NO White Card gained by completing an online White Card Course will be accepted** as we cannot verify 100% that the student completed the online course themselves. So please see the Career Adviser.

Mini BIG Career Expo

This career expo was held for year 10 to year 12 students to assist with subject selection and post-school options. Students were able to speak to and collect relevant information from interested stalls. Our guests were very impressed with student behaviour and engagement with everyone. Our guests included University of Sydney, Western Sydney University, University of Technology, Macquarie University, University of New South Wales, TAFE, WPC Parramatta, Sandra Russo Apprenticeships, Australian College of Business, Australian Institute of Entertainment, Gateway Apprenticeships & Traineeships, just to name a few.

Dear Parents

Nationally consistent collection of data on school students with disability - 2019

Our school is participating in the collection of nationally consistent data on school students with disability.

We will be collecting information already available in the school about the support that is being provided to students with disability. Better data will help the Government plan for students with disability.

The data collection will have no direct impact on your child and they will not be involved in any testing process. The NSW Department of Education and Communities will provide data to the Australian Government from all NSW public schools in such a way that no individual student or school will be able to be identified.
