Examinations

Year 11 students have just completed their Yearly exams. Next term, they will embark on the HSC course in their respective subjects. Students allowed to transition to year 12 must have demonstrated serious work ethic in year 11. The yearly examinations for years 7-10 will commence in week 5 next term. Head Teacher Welfare Report

During this lockdown period, our Year advisors and Wellbeing team have been working overtime to look after the needs of our students. Year Advisors have been doing an amazing job with engaging our students in wellbeing initiatives throughout the term. I would also like to welcome the new Year 11 Year advisor Elizabeth Haeva, and Year 10 Adviser Mr Kevin O'Halloran to the welfare team.

All year groups have been given access to google classrooms in which they can stay connected to staff. I suggest that your son check in online regularly to see what's happening and to reach out if there are any concerns. Students without a login code can contact the school.

Our Counsellor, Jess Cashman is a big part of our Wellbeing team and is providing constant, ongoing support to our students remotely. Learning from home and being in lockdown can take a significant toll on students and their families. ENGLISH REPORT Ms Ghamraoui

Term 3 has been a very busy term for students and staff in English. We welcome our new English teachers who have joined our team in motivating our students to achieve excellence in English at GBHS. The English faculty is working hard to improve our learning programs to ensure every student is engaged in learning and achieving the best possible outcomes in English. The English teachers would like to acknowledge the resilience and hard work that students have displayed with remote learning.

Year 7

Students in Year 7 undertook an introductory study of poetry and responded to the focus question: 'How do composers use poetry to express themselves?' The literacy focus for the term was poetic techniques and using figurative language. A range of classical international, Australian poetry and contemporary song lyrics was analysed and discussed throughout the learning unit. Students composed an anthology of different forms of poetry that addressed a social issue as part of their assessment work

Year 8

Students in Year 8 undertook an Australian poetry study. Students analysed and discussed a range of traditional and contemporary Australian poems. The literacy focus for the term was poetic techniques and using figurative language to shape meaning. Students composed their own Australian poem that represented their ideas about Australian identity. Year 9

Students explored the theme of survival through the novel study Lord of the Flies. Year 9 read and annotated the novel while examining the diverse relationships between the characters. Students explored the features of a survival novel and composed their own survival narrative. The literacy focus for the term was writing and reading,

including the metalanguage of survival texts.

Year 10

Students in Year 10 completed a close study of Shakespeare's 'Romeo and Juliet'. Students examined the motives behind the characters' actions in the play and realised how its themes are universal and timeless. Students composed an extended response, which analysed the themes and dramatic techniques used in play.

MATHEMATICS REPORT Mrs Khan

Maths Faculty Report Term 3 2021

Beginning of term 3 came with a huge challenge for both teachers and students; online teaching and learning.

Teachers and students had to mentally prepare themselves for this shift. It has been very challenging for all involved. However, teachers had been busy preparing and delivering lessons and assessments for students online. Teachers tirelessly helped students to improve their technological skills in navigating new platforms, learning to submit work and retrieve their work to see teacher feedback. Teachers are commended for their efforts in engaging students in learning.

Thank you to parents for supporting their sons through this remote learning phase.

Staff members who teach year 12 classes have written final reports for the year 12 students and have also been preparing students for their HSC examinations by providing revision materials and revising content online. All year 12 students did their final assessment online. Students are strongly advised to act on the feedback and recommendations from their teachers to improve their success in HSC examinations.

For students to do well they must embark on a study routine to improve their ability to recall and apply knowledge when needed. It is very important to revise by doing questions from past exam papers because mathematical skills can only be refined by regular practice. Maths is a "doing" subject and the more a student practices the better developed his skills and techniques become. Students need to have a thorough look at the reference sheets provided in the exam to know what information is available to them and what they need to memorise. Students can practise questions from past HSC examinations. These exams can be accessed through the link below:

Students are also highly recommended to read the marking guidelines provided. Students can also access help from their teachers by posting questions and queries on their google classroom.

During the term 3 school holidays, there will be tutorial sessions happening online to support students in their HSC preparations.

HSIE REPORT Mr Mandarakas

In the last week of Term 2, Year 7 HSIE students visited the Chau Chak Wing Museum -- a new museum of art, science, and history -- located on the grounds of the University of Sydney. At this museum, students learned about ancient cultures and built their historical investigative skills as they handled and interpreted ancient artefacts. The knowledge and skills they gained in this excursion they continued to build on throughout this term. Through online learning activities, students dived deep into the history of the Vikings -- including their culture, their beliefs, and their way of life. Students worked together on mini-projects, wrote investigative essays, created online quizzes to showcase their own knowledge and test their classmates, and concluded the term with a major assessment task where they researched several key Viking artefacts, directly bringing to the fore the skills they learned at last term's Museum visit.

Longships:

The Oseberg ship is a wellpreserved Viking ship discovered in a large burial mound at the Oseberg farm near Tønsberg in Vestfold County, Norway. The longboat is acknowledged to be among the finer artefacts to have survived the Viking Period. The ship and its contents are displayed at the Viking Ship Museum in Western Oslo.

Features of the Oseberg Ship

- The Oseberg Ship is built using the clinker method (overlapping planks to make them stronger and less stiff.
- It is 21.58 metres (70.8 ft) long and 5.10 metres (16.7 ft) broad, with a mast of approximately 9–10 metres (30–33 ft). With a sail of around 90 source metres (70 so ft), the shin could achieve a sneed up to 10 knots.
- around 90 square metres (970 sq ft), the ship could achieve a speed up to 10 knots. 3. The Oseberg Ship has 15 pairs of oar holes so 30 people can row it.

What was the purpose of the Oseberg Ship?

In 834 CE, two wealthy women died. The Oseberg ship was beached and used as a burial ship for the two women aboard. It was richly decorated and equipped with delightful burial gifts and possessions. The ship and grave goods are well-preserved because of the blue clay where it was buried. It is called the Oseberg ship because of the farm it was found on.

Why will the Oseberg ship be presented in my museum display?

The Oseberg ship will be displayed in my gallery because it symbolises Viking culture. Wealthy and important people (*Jarls*) were buried or cremated in longships with their possessions to be prepared for the afterlife, and if they were heroes and warriors, Valhalla. The Oseberg ship represents the Viking culture in burying people with their longships and their personation.

This term year 8 worked on the topic of "Water in the World". They learnt about the causes of water scarcity and the ways in which individuals and countries can work together to solve the problem of water shortages. They studied access to fresh water in both developing and developed countries. The students also completed an assessment task on a chosen African country and explained the causes and consequences of water shortage and what the individuals and country can do to manage water more effectively. The boys developed their ICT skills and presented their tasks in various multimodal forms.



This semester in Year 10 Geography students studied the topic Changing Places. Students have examined the patterns and trends in population movements and the increasing urbanisation of countries. They have discussed the reasons for internal and international migration patterns and the consequences of population movements. There is no doubt it has been a significant cognitive challenge for students while learning remotely, but most students have overcome the challenges and have engaged in remote learning. Students have completed their assessment tasks to a very high standard and have also developed their analytical, computer, critical-thinking and presentation skills.

Students in the Year 9 and 10 Elective Robotics classes have been busy building and programming robots at home and using online zoom classes to present and discuss their work. They have also been working on innovation projects and have been developing innovative solutions to problems in the cargo and transport industry. Students will be entering their finished projects into a design competition next term.

Year 10 HSIE and robotics students continued working on the Parramatta light rail project using cospaces software to create a 3D model of the rail network and surrounding district using virtual reality technology. Students were able to complete this project while learning from home and have incorporated their own extensive geographical and historical research, artwork, photography, and their own musical performances into this amazing project.

Students also entered a competition to name the new bridge over James Ruse Drive which is part of the light rail construction. Their idea is to call it the Linda Bernie Bridge after Linda Bernie who is a proud member of the Wiradjuri nation, the first Aboriginal person to be elected to State Parliament and the first aboriginal woman to be elected to the House of Representatives. The bridge is NSW's second longest steel arch bridge.

Year 10 HSIE1 have also been rehearsing the play The Freedom Ride on Zoom as part of their investigation into the rights and freedoms topic and, in particular, the 1965 freedom ride campaign to expose injustice and racism toward indigenous Australians in regional NSW towns. The students have developed a very good understanding of the struggle of aboriginal Australians to gain recognition, rights and freedoms and the students plan to perform the play to an audience next term.

This term the Retail Services students actively engaged and participated in online lessons. They completed all theoretical aspects of the cluster tasks and completed all mandatory online certificates. CAPA REPORT Mr Hablos

This term CAPA at GBHS has continued to grow through the direct expertise of our experienced staff. The CAPA faculty has been very busy producing hands-on, creative and informative programs and projects for students from year 7-12. I'd like to formally introduce myself; My name is Mr Ahmed Hablos and I am the new Head Teacher of Creative and Performing Arts at GBHS. Here is a snippet into CAPA for term 3 during online learning.

MUSIC

With a busy Term 3 The Music program at GBHS has had a shift to an online technology-based program. Tutoring has been minimal and some students have been able to take instruments home and continue their practice, while Miss Moala has been tutoring senior and HSC students through Zoom and other online platforms.

Year 7 Music class has been busy learning about Music's role in film, TV and Gaming. They have researched some of the world's most popular music composers and used their ICT skills to create a viva voce (musicology) presentation.

Year 8 have been working through their hard copy booklets in conjunction with online lessons. The boys have been challenged with Kahoots to keep up their spirits and encourage a little healthy competition whilst isolating. The major assessment task of the term has been on Music Producers. The students were given a choice of famous producers and had to submit a 5 slide presentation outlining the role of a music producer, the success of the artist/s being produced, a list of the famous song, interesting facts and a bibliography outlining the source of information. Dr Dre was the most popular music producer that the boys researched. It was wonderful to see how engaged the students were in their preparation.

Year 10 and 11 Music have been looking into Technology and its influence on Music through online DAW software, creating and producing beats and music like professional 21st century producers. They have learned the history of audio from the phonograph to streaming music and everything in between. The boys logged into a world of experimental technologies and current software in order to learn about the progression technology has made in the Music industry and its impact on the general population. Year 10 worked collaboratively online creating compositions on Soundation. This is a music software program that has the capacity to record and arrange musical loops with 100's of pre-sampled examples. The students successfully composed music using multiple layers, rhythms, accompaniments and sound sources.

Year 12 HSC Music

This term students have dedicated themselves to adjust smoothly onto online learning. Year 7's completed their Recycled Robots Unit of work. They learnt how to use found objects from home to create their own Recycled Robot. They have developed technique through observational tonal drawing, learnt about the life of the artist Arcimboldo and gained valuable insights to important developments in the creation of robots. Almost every invention in the history of mankind, and certainly every work of art, began as a sketch. And from that first sketch wonders emerged! Year 8's completed their Pop Art unit of work looking at the Pop Art movement with the focus being on popular culture, mass production and consumer society. They have investigated several prominent Pop Artists such as Andy Warhol, Roy Litchenstein and Keith Haring to inform their own artmaking practice. Students had the opportunity to learn about themselves as a consumer who contributes to a new, generational popular culture. They have been working hard to complete a series of Pop Artworks and drawings using a variety of media (Digital Media, paint, pencils and markers). Year 9's completed their Collected Curiosities unit of work. They were introduced to photography as a form of art which provided the students with valuable insights and awareness of how different themes can be used to respond to the conceptual framework and the frames, to make and study images. The students explored the history of photography from the very first photograph taken by French inventor Joseph Nicéphore Niépce in 1826/7 which required an exposure of 8 hours. It wasn't until 2007, where we saw a breakthrough in technological advances of the iPhone being introduced, beginning the era of smartphones. This technology leads to photography becoming a part of our lives like never before. Students applied their knowledge of photography composition and digital manipulation techniques learnt in class to create their own digital colour wheel collage using their mobile phones to capture images and photoshop application. COMPUTERS

Students in Year 10 Multimedia have been learning about the concepts of multimedia design. They have experimented with a variety of file formats and utilised the adobe suite to manipulate images, create cell-based animations and edit movie scenes for a video trailer.
