DEPUTY PRINCIPAL'S REPORT Ms Ram

Finally, we have come to the end of 2022 school year. It seemed like a very long year, but full of exciting activities happening all year around. At this time of the year, teachers have been extremely busy testing, marking, and writing reports. Academic Awards Ceremony held on the 13th of December was a huge success, with parents and students converging to school to celebrate students' academic and sporting successes. Student reports for Semester 2 were issued on the same day.

Electives Choices for 2023

During Semester 2, students in years 8, 9, 10 have chosen elective subjects to do in 2023. Their elective choices will be published on school noticeboards. If students did not get into the elective subject of their choice, they will be allowed to change electives in the first two weeks. This will require students to get approval from their parents and careers adviser. Entry into some subjects will depend on the class size as well as payment of course fees for the new subject.

Year 7 Orientation Day

Year 7s from feeder primary schools attended Granville Boys on the 29th of November. They got to meet some of the teachers, executive, their year adviser, Ms Martin, as well as participate in a few workshops. Year 7's were very excited to see a few familiar faces of their friends and cousins at the school. Students enjoyed the activities and went home satisfied with their high school experience. Opal Cards

Students must have a valid opal card to travel on the School bus 511 or 514 or any public transport (bus or train) Application for Opal cards need to completed this year for it to arrive in time for school next year. Use the link below.

The School Student Transport Scheme (SSTS) provides eligible school students with free or subsidised travel from home to school.

The scheme includes:

- Free travel to and from home and school on approved metro, train, bus, ferry and light rail services during school term.
- Discounted travel on buses between home and school with a <u>School Term Bus Pass</u>.
- Free travel on NSW TrainLink Regional services and long distance coach services for boarding school students.
- <u>Subsidised travel</u> to and from school in private vehicles in areas where there is no public transport available.

Free school travel passes **do not include** travel to and from:

- before and after school care or child-minding premises
- before and after school activities
- school excursions
- sports events
- work experience
- Vocational Education and Training (VET) at a location away from where the student is enrolled
- multi-campus high schools, weekend schools, pre-schools or mini-schools (except for full-time geographically isolated distance education students).

Student must comply with the <u>Student Codes of</u> <u>Conduct</u>.

Code of conduct for school students on buses

It is every student's responsibility to behave in a manner that ensures the safety and comfort of passengers and drivers. This includes:

Behaviour on buses

- Use appropriate language not offensive or racist language
- Fighting, spitting, feet on seats, throwing things in or from the bus is not permitted
- No eating or drinking (other than water) unless for medical reasons or the bus operator gives written permission.
- Offer seats to adults including people with a disability, elderly or expectant mothers
- Do not push or shove other people
- Do not bully or harass other passengers or the driver
- Avoid attracting the attention of the driver except in the case of emergency
- Do not play music at such volume that it may distract the bus driver or other passengers.

Safety on and near buses

- Obey reasonable directions from the driver (e.g. where to sit or to remain in the bus)
- Remain in your seat do not move around the bus unnecessarily
- If standing, remain behind the front passenger seat and keep a secure hand hold at all times
- Keep bags and other items clear of the aisle
- Do not allow any part of your body to protrude out of the bus at any time
- Wait for the bus in a quiet and orderly manner including at bus interchanges
- Stand away from the roadside until the bus comes to a complete stop
- Allow other passengers to leave the bus before stepping onto the bus in a single line
- Wait until the bus stops before moving to get off the bus at your designated stop
- Cross the road where and when it's safe to do so, use crossings/traffic lights where available.

Legal considerations on buses

- Wear the seat belt properly adjusted and fastened, if one is available
- Obey the law that bans smoking on buses
- Ensure that buses are not vandalised report any damage, e.g. graffiti and window etching, to the driver
- Do not interfere with bus property, equipment and signage
- Do not leave rubbish on the bus, or at bus stops or interchanges.

Using bus passes:

• Show travel passes or tickets to the driver on boarding and to Authorised Revenue Protection Officers, NSW

- Police Officers or bus company representative when requested
- Use the travel pass only for its intended purpose - do not lend your pass to other students or borrow a pass from them
- If issued with a School Opal card, always tap on when boarding and tap off when leaving the bus.

Disobeying these rules may lead to the withdrawal of bus travel passes, banning students from travelling on buses and/or police prosecution and court action.

Who's eligible for a school travel pass?

Secondary school students from Years 7-12 are eligible if:

- They are a resident of NSW or an overseas student who is eligible for free government education,
- The straight-line distance from their home address to school is more than 2 km, or
- The walking distance from home to school is 2.9 km or further.

Secondary school students who live too close to the school to be eligible for free travel may qualify for a <u>School Term Bus Pass</u> which provides bus travel at a discounted price for the whole school term.

School Term Bus Pass

If you don't qualify for free school travel, you may be able to buy a School Term Bus Pass.

A School Term Bus Pass offers discounted travel on buses between home and school for the whole school term.

A School Term Bus Pass is valid for travel between home and school on school days only, via the most direct route. It is only valid for one bus operator.

Students who have been rejected for other reasons other than the radial or walking distance cannot apply for a School Term Bus Pass. They will need to <u>apply for a</u> <u>Child/Youth Opal card</u>.

Code of Learning

To ensure that school is a safe and happy place for every staff and student at Granville Boys, and that the teaching -learning process supports students achieve their potential, all students are required to understand their responsibility and commitment to respecting everyone's right to learn without interruption. DEPUTY PRINCIPAL'S REPORT Mr Mandarakas

Teachers have continued their investigation of the What Works Best and have focussed on the skills of explicit teaching. To implement this strategy teachers have partnered with another teacher outside of their own faculty to observe the first 10 minutes of each other's lesson. Teachers paid particular attention to the specific instructions given to students about what they would be learning and the activities that they would be completing. Explicit instructions ensure students have a clear understanding of why they are learning something, how it connects to what they already know, what is expected of them, and how to do it.

Another high impact teaching strategy being implemented is differentiation. Differentiation is the process of making adjustments to aspects of lesson content, teaching methodology and product according to the needs, readiness and interests of the students.

Teachers have also used professional learning time to analyse NAPLAN data. Data shows that across all areas strong improvement has occurred. Teachers are using the data to plan lessons targeting the specific needs of students.

At the end of Term 3, students took part in a gala day. Unlike previous gala days students this year were part of a House. The names of these houses are based on the first four principals of this school, Evans Reilly Steinbeck and Kempster. House captains were elected this term and their first task was to design a logo for their House team. With every event that students entered and for every positive a student earns in the classroom, at assembly or in the playground a point is awarded to their House. This year 15667 Respectful and Safe Learner awards (RaSLs) were given out to students by teachers.

Finally congratulations to all our students who were rewarded for their achievements at yesterday's School Awards Ceremony.

WELFARE REPORT Mr El-Homsi

As we come to the end of 2022, I would like to congratulate all our students on completing yet another successful schooling year at Granville Boys High School. One of the main focuses of the welfare team in 2022 was student attendance and welfare.

Through the help of the welfare team, we have established new protocols that will streamline all welfare concerns at our school. I would like to take this opportunity to thank the School Counsellors and Year Advisors on their continuous dedication in nurturing your child's education. In 2023, we have initiated a new attendance improvement program at Granville Boys High School that specially targets whole day attendance, partial attendance and lateness to school. Our aim is to help students achieve a 85% - 90% attendance rate and reduce late arrivals to school. Students who achieve and maintain an attendance rate of 85%-90% have been rewarded with an excursion to Raging Waters. We will continue to work with parents/caregivers, students and the wider school community to improve our attendance in 2023.

Important information about attendance:

Attendance at school is compulsory, five days a week. Apart from the legal requirements for attendance, it is important that students gain continuity in their education to move ahead as they should. It is possible that due to an unsatisfactory record of attendance, a student is not meeting course outcomes, this could affect a student's eligibility to receive their ROSA, Preliminary Certificate or Higher School Certificate. It is, therefore, important that students develop habits of good attendance right from the start. The school recognises, however, that for a variety of sound reasons illness, dental appointments, such as family emergencies that students may not be able to attend school every day. In such cases, an exemption from school is granted and recorded on the rolls. A written explanation such as doctor's certificate is still required on the child's return to school. Please read the following paragraphs closely.

WHOLE DAY ABSENCES: If your child is absent due to illness or any other unforeseen reason a phone call to the school office is advisable. A note should also be produced on the first day back to school and presented to the relevant Year Advisor or the front office. If a student is away for any reason and you have not contacted the school, you will receive a phone call home from the relevant Year Advisor advising you of your child's absence. A written explanation is still required on the child's return to school. Absentee notes can be collected from the Year Advisors or me. Unexplained student absence is reported on school reports. Any extended leave of absence, including overseas travel must have prior approval from the Principal. Overseas travel also contributes to a decline in attendance percentage.

FRACTIONAL TRUANCY: It is essential that students attend every class in a day. At the end of each school day Deputy Principals and myself will check the truancy register and follow up on all students who have been recognised as fractional truants. Unauthorised absence is treated as a discipline issue and will result in sanctions such as afternoon detention. Parents are informed of such breaches through phone contacts.

LATENESS TO SCHOOL: School starts at 9:00 and students must straight away go to their period 1 classes. Students arriving late to school will miss out on the work covered during period 1. If your son is late to school, they must report to the front office and collect a late note before attending their classes. Parents will be notified of students who are regularly late to school. Students who are late 3 times or without written explanation will be placed on after school detention. Uniform 2022 A school instils the right values, a positive attitude, and the will to achieve things in life. Whether it is applying the knowledge to secure the right job or respecting the fellow citizens or earning income for the family, it is the school education that helps the child to achieve the desired goals. It is the school of your child that deals with the issues such as discipline, individualism and peer pressure and the school uniform help to achieve these goals.

<u>Year 7</u>



Students in Year 7 were introduced to Shakespeare and underwent a comparative study of 'Twelfth Night' and the modern 'She's the Man'. adaptation, Students examined the texts to answer the inquiry question, 'Who's using Shakespeare's The ideas?' literacy focuses

during this term were discursive writing and using sensory language in texts.

Year 8




Students in Year 8 undertook a film study of The Iron Giant and a genre study of science fiction to respond to the focus question: 'Why do we have a fear of the unknown?' The literacy focus for the term was persuasive writing and analysing visual techniques. Students composed a persuasive essay as part of their

summative assessment work.

<u>Year 9</u>

Year 9 students responded to the inquiry question, 'How has masculinity been portrayed in poetry over time?'. Students studied a collection of poems from around the world and composed their own texts in response to the inquiry question. The literacy focuses during this term were essay writing and poetic forms and features.

<u>Year 10</u>



Year 10 students engaged with the Shakespearean tragedy 'Othello'. Students examined the motives behind the characters' actions in the play and realised how its themes are universal and timeless. Students composed an extended response, which analysed the themes and dramatic techniques used in play.

<u>Year 11/12</u>

Year 11 embarked on their first HSC module – 'Texts and the Human Experience'. Students across all three strands of English completed this common module, using different texts as their focus. Students in the English Advanced and English Studies courses completed a digital multimodal presentation for their assessment work and students in the English Standard course completed a persuasive text. We farewelled the 2022 Year 12 students and wish them all the best in their future endeavours.



HSIE REPORT Ms Donnelly

It has been another busy semester in the HSIE faculty

STAGE 4

In Year 7 students developed knowledge and understanding of significant changes and developments from the past. They developed skills to undertake a historical inquiry to learn about people and events that shaped past civilisations, particularly the Viking and Polynesian civilisations.

Year 8 students engaged in the Water in the World topic which involved an exhaustive study of our relationship with water, access to water, water scarcity, water hygiene, and how we can ensure continued water supply into the future. In the Place and Liveability topic, students discussed how spatial patterns and functions contribute to a sense of place, and examine the economic, social, and cultural factors that contribute to the liveability of a particular place.

STAGE 5

Year 9 and 10 HSIE students investigated the nature and differences in human wellbeing and development that exists within and between countries and examined world issues that affect development and its impact on human wellbeing. They also investigated the patterns and trends in population movements including strategies to create liveable and sustainable urban places.

Year 9 Elective Geography students undertook projects to guide their learning of geographical concepts. In "Open for Business", students created an advertising campaign for a developing country in order to boost the tourism and trade of that country. In "Big Australia", students created a plan and 3D model of how they would improve the liveability and sustainability of a Sydney suburb. In both projects, students utilised video editing software, creativity, critical thinking skills and collaboration.

Year 9 and 10 students of Elective History covered the topics 'Holocaust', 'Jack the Ripper' and 'Heroes and Villains'. In the Jack the Ripper unit, students learnt about the infamous serial killer and completed an in class writing assessment task. For the Heroes and Villains unit, students investigated the different perspectives surrounding a range of historical figures such as Genghis Khan, Blackbeard and Ned Kelly. By learning about these figures students questioned what makes an individual a hero or villain. In order to consolidate their learning, their assessment task consisted of them presenting on a chosen historical figure.

STAGE 6

Our 2022 HSC candidates sat for their exams earlier in term 4 and we wish them the best of luck as they nervously await their results. Our year 11 students have been working busily throughout the year and I congratulation the following students for achieving First Place in Subject awards for HSIE subjects: 11 Ancient History – Taneem Zakir, 11 Legal Studies – Anshuman Tripathi, 11 Business Studies – Taneem Zakir, 11 Retail Services – Rami Hussein, 11 Modern History – Taneem Zakir, 11 Studies of Religion – Ibrahim Choubassi, 11 iStem – Atakan Ozturk, 11 EVET – Luis Sabino Da Silva.

Congratulations also to Atakan Ozturk who was selected to participate in the Constitutional Convention at NSW Parliament House. Guests were welcomed by the Honourable Jonathan O'Dea Speaker of the Legislative Assembly and enjoyed a keynote address by Anne Twomey, Professor of Constitutional Law & Director Constitutional Reform Unit at the University of Sydney

INNOVATIVE LEARNING & ROBOTICS

Year 7 and 8 students worked in groups to investigate and respond to real-life problems and challenges. During their group projects, students worked collaboratively to apply a range of communication techniques and appropriate technologies to design and present their solutions. Students became entrepreneurs and developed ideas to market their products at the Entrepreneur's Expo that was held in the gym.

This semester, 42 students from Years 8, 9, 10, 12 formed twelve GRANBOTS teams to compete in robotics competitions.

Eight GRANBOTS teams competed in two regional VEX robotics competitions. Three of those teams (11 students from Y10) progressed to compete at the VEX VRC National Competition at Sydney Olympic Park. The Granbots were the only NSW public school competing against private schools and robotics organisations at this national level competition.

We had four teams compete in the FLL Robotics Competition at regional competitions and two of the teams (14 students from Years 8, 9 and 12) progressed to compete in the FLL National Competition at Macquarie University. Ultimately, the Granbots 2 team (combined year 8 and 9) won the Rising Star Award and the Granbots 1 team (Year 12) won a place at the FLL International Robotics Competition at Arkansas USA in April next year. Go Granbots!

Our Year 9 and 10 iSTEM Robotics students entertained 165 primary school students on Orientation Day with a robotics and drone demonstration. In week 5, we hosted a robotics workshop and 20 students from Bankstown Girls HS came to our school to work collaboratively with our students. In week 10, twenty of our robotics students from Years 8 to 12 went to Bankstown Girls to participate in robotics activities.

EVET Electrotechnology Robotics students completed a 5 day work placement with Amazon Web Services in which they learnt to build Quarkey robots for the AWS Girls Tech Day. Students assisted staff from Amazon Web Services with DEEP race, an AI powered autonomous model racing car event. They participated in a training session from Stempedia and DEEP race by international experts.

The GBHS Robotics program has had a successful year and I want to take the opportunity to say a massive THANKYOU to our major sponsor, Ray Itaoui, owner of Sanity and also an ex-student of Granville Boys HS, for his generous financial support to the Robotics program. I would also like to thank Rockwell Engineering who are our sponsor and mentor in the FRC competition.

PEER MEDIATION

This semester, students from 8G and 7N completed a Peer mediation course in which they developed communication and problem solving skills while learning about the concept of mediation through workshops that involve role plays and discussion. Our student mediator continued to successfully assist their peers to resolve conflicts through peer mediation.

Congratulations to Mrs Nabanita Ghosh for being awarded the Western Sydney Schools Leadership award and also to Ms Michelle Mai, Ms Phoebe Mai and Ms Christina Kim for achieving their NESA Proficient Teaching qualification.

MATHEMATICS REPORT Ms Khan

This term is coming to an end and the teachers in the Mathematics faculty have been busy with assessing students and writing their yearly reports. Many of the junior students have performed extremely well in their assessments.

Accelerated Maths Year 10 students have started their HSC Mathematics Advanced course and have completed their first HSC assessment task with students performing at a very high level.

The Year 12 students have also had their first formal HSC assessment task. For all the Mathematics courses this task was worth 25% of their assessment mark for the final HSC exams. After completing this task, students must realise that a thorough preparation for HSC tasks are required so that the results could contribute towards the quality of their grades. Therefore, students should take the opportunity during the Christmas holidays to catch up and master the content of the preliminary course and the first topics of the HSC course. Students will be provided with work for the holiday period and additional work is going to be provided later in the holidays.

Students should read through the markers comments to see where most of the mistakes have been made by previous students. Students should also attempt the questions related to the topics they have completed to get an idea of the examination type questions and start preparing for their HSC exams.

Accelerated Maths Year 11 students have also sat for their HSC Mathematics Advanced examination and are awaiting their results.

In preparation for the beginning of next term and the new school year, students should get themselves ready to be back in school by making sure they have all the equipment they require. A 5mm A4 grid book (covered), a scientific calculator and other writing stationery will be needed for effective learning next year.

Finally, congratulations to our practical teachers Ms Merve Uz from the Western Sydney University and Anna Tran and Vivienne Su from University of New South Wales for their efforts in their development as classroom teachers and on behalf of all the MATHS staff we wish them the very best in their teaching careers.


